Telegraphic Summary.

NEW YORK, Dec. 20.—The Herald's
Brussels correspondent telegraphs this
morning that the bombardment of
Prais is declared to be impossible. It
is not humanity that restrains the Prus-
sians but simply impossibility for them to
succeed, as they have neither the num-
ber nor caliber of guns necessary. The
Prussians only have 500 guns, mainly
20 pounders. The French works which
command their batteries can destroy them
the moment that they open fire.
Paris has two months supply of food.

Neither of the French armies com-
manded by Chaucey and Bourski number
less than 100,000 men, and they can
draw reinforcements from other
parts of France for nearly double that
number. The appearance of the French
armies is favorable.

The King of Prussia has received
the address at Versailles, and accepts
the dignity of Emperor tendered with
unanimous voice by Princes, free towns
and the German nation. Abolition of
the Scheldt dues is voted.

There has been no fighting before Paris
since the 10th. The people have outside
news to the 11th they are nudis-
mated. Order is perfect and stores
are ample.

LONDON, Dec. 20.—Grant's message
was reproduced here at length. The
Times says President Grant expects
England to take the initiative in reopening
negotiation. He will be disappointed.
It was the Americans who rejected
the last settlement.

LONDON, Dec. 19.—The Prussians
are short of men and 20,000 fresh
troops are coming in, but Versailles is
likely soon to be untenable, as heavy
guns of the French, which are being
moved forward, will soon bring the
place within their range, and the
French are resolved to destroy it.
Eventually, Paris will fall by starva-
tion, but not within three months.
There will be no bombardment.

Prussians, 21,000 strong, attacked
Nuits yesterday with 11 batteries. After
a combat of 5 hours, in which they
sustained heavy losses, they occupied
the place. It is reported that the battle
will be resumed to-day. One army
falls back as Gen. Bourbaki advances.

VIENNA.—A conference respecting
mediation was held by representatives
of the neutral Powers at the Foreign
Office on Thursday last. All Ambassa-
dors were present. The basis proposed
is as follows: The neutrals to acquiesce
in the annexation of Luxemburg; to
acknowledge William the Emperor of
Germany; France to pay 1,200,000,000
francs, raise the two frontier fortifica-
tions, cede the district of Alsace to
Germany and acknowledge the German
Emperor. Count Mosbourg said France
would pay more money rather than cede
a mile of territory.

A Mistaken Idea.

The Examiner says the Republican
party will have no available candidate
for President in 1872, save the present
incumbent. We can inform the Exam-
iner and the balance of the world, that
Gen. Grant will not be the Republican
candidate for President in 1872 or at
any other period.

WINTERING STOCK.—It is an old
and true saying that "cattle well win-
tered are half summered." When cat-
tle are exposed to our chilling winter
rains, and are poorly fed, if they live
till spring, they are in a bad condition
—they stop growing—and will not at-
tain their usual thrift until the next
midsummer. This fact is obvious to
all—and yet we find many farmers
burning their straw, and compelling
their cattle to live on the miserable
pickings of the field, without shelter,
and seem to be astonished when their
stock lie down, are unable to rise, and
die. If they, in consequence of a fa-
vorable winter, live till spring, they are
little better than living skeletons. We
have seen bands of such stock purchas-
ed in the Willamette valley, and ship-
ped to the upper country in spring,
which hardly had strength enough to
walk from the steamers to the shore,
where they were landed. We thought,
then, if there had been a society in the
neighborhood for the prevention of cru-
elty to animals, they would have found
a strong case here to justify their in-
terference.—Farmer.

ANOTHER SEIZURE.—Revenue seizures
are becoming frequent in this re-
gion. The other day the Eugene brewer
came down with a load of beer for Mr.
Hodes, and some of the kegs not being
stamped the whole load was seized by
the Revenue officers, and is now in
their possession. The brewer claims
that the kegs were a' properly stamped
when he started, but that the excessive
rains washed the stamps off of all that
were exposed. The Hunt Brewery is
still in durance vile.

AVANCED.—Kerosene oil seems to
have taken a sudden rise very lately,
advancing in markets below to seventy
cents per gallon, from 40 cents, the
late ruling rates. No explanation fol-
low the report, hence it is presumed "a
corner" has been made.

STATE ITEMS.

[From the Statesman]

In the Senate of the United States,
Dec. 5th Mr. Williams asked, and by
unanimous consent obtained, leave to
bring in the following joint resolution,
which was read twice, and ordered to
be printed:

JOINT RESOLUTION.

Explanatory of the Act admitting the
State of Oregon into the Union.

Whereas, Doubts have arisen as to
the effect of the Act for the admission
of Oregon, approved February the 14th,
1859, so far as it relates to the five
hundred thousand acres of land granted
to said State by an Act entitled "An
Act to appropriate the proceedings of
the public lands, and to grant pre-emp-
tion rights," approved September 4th,
1841: therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate and
House of Representatives of the United
States of America, in Congress assem-
bled, That Congress, by its said Act
admitting said State into the Union,
did, and hereby doth, assent to the ap-
plication of said lands for the support of
common schools, as made in the second
section of the eighth Article of the Con-
stitution of said State.

This does not require any explana-
tion. We shall comment upon it in due
time. Senator Williams means busi-
ness.

It seems that Rev. J. H. Willbur is
soon to leave his pastorate here in Sa-
lem to take charge of the Yakima
Agency, East of the Cascades in
Washington Territory, which position
he successfully filled, but declined to
re-accept under the late Superintendent
of that Territory. Mr. Dickson, who
is appointed to the Unatilla Agency,
was with Mr. Willbur at the Yakima,
and is supposed to have been promoted
on his recommendation. Gen. Joel
Palmer is nominated for Grand Round
Agency (the dispatch says John Pal-
mer, but we think the Gen. is meant),
and Mr. L. S. Dyer of Salem is ap-
pointed to Siletta. These gentlemen are
all Methodists we understand, while
Cap. John Smith, Agent at Warm
Springs, where he was reinstated sev-
eral months ago, is a representative of
the Presbyterians. So we seem to see
the promised policy introduced, and as
the Agents now in position at the Grand
Round and Siletta are good and energet-
ic men, we must conclude that their re-
moval is due to the adoption of this
policy and not to any personal or un-
friendly considerations.
