It was butchered in the morning, and hung up in the yard all day where it was visited by a large number of persons.

On Sunday last, about noon, an alarm of fire was sounded. The fire proved to be in the wood-shed attached to the parsonage of the M. E. Church. The family of the occupant, Rev. D. L. Spalding, was absent the previous night, and had been home but a short time. The work was supposed to be that of an incendiary, as there was no chance for the fire to get into the woodpile, unless placed there. No damage was done, further than the burning of a few sticks of fire-wood.

We call attention to the weather record for 1870, furnished us by Mr. T. Pearce, of Eola, in this county. By referring to the Report for 1869, we find the coldest weather in December of that year was on the 21st, being 24°. The warmest on the 12th, 46°. In December, 1870, we find the lowest temperature on the 22nd, 20°. The highest on the 29th and 30th, 50°. Mean temperature for December 1869, 37°. Mean temperature for December 1870, 33°, showing four degrees more of frost in December 1870 than in the same month of 1869.

We were shown to-day the papers, issued from head quarters at Washington, passing fees over the general stage, boat and railroad lines from this place to New York City and back, our esteemed friend and townsman L. A. Bobb, for the purpose of receiving from the Government, free of charge, an artificial leg, in place of one lost by him while fighting in the South to maintain and perpetuate that Government, which has given as the proud name of Americans and citizens of the United States. On Monday night, Prof. Hermann entertained a large crowd at Phy's Hall. After performing a number of slippery hand tricks, he impersonated the Hon. Miss Black, in her speech on Women's Rights. We had witnessed this twice before, yet the piece was acted so admirably, that in spite of the presence of a large company of ladies, we, in common with all present, indulged in many a full-breasted laugh. He next appeared in a speech, calculated as a burlesque on a certain Judge, who made a speech at the Court House, not long since, on the future of Oregon. The performance wound up with the imitable play, the African Magician. Believing that a person may "laph and gro phat," we advise all who think the same, to visit Prof. H. whenever opportunity offers.

Telegraphic Summary.

BORDEAUX, Dec. 31.—Gen. Faidherbe, commanding the Army of the North, is again in motion. The Prussians retreated before the French advances.

It is reported the Prussian cavalry have become almost useless since the recent snow and frost. In consequence of keeping communication open, the Prussians around Paris have been re-served in their movements.

VERSAILLES, Dec. 27.—Everything is ready for a bombardment on a terrific scale simultaneously, in a circle around the devoted city. All officers have gone to the front and the artillery commenced firing upon the French posts.

MADRID, Dec. 31.—Gen. Prim died this morning at one o'clock. All engaged in his assassination escaped. The death of Prim produced a profound sensation of grief all over Spain. The Republican militia battalions of Madrid nearly all surrendered their arms, by order of the Government of Madrid.

ROME, Dec. 31.—Victor Emanuel has entered the city.

VERSAILLES, Jan. 3.—It is reported that the Grand Duke of Mecklenburg was dismissed summarily from his command by Moltke, for not keeping the French at a respectful distance.

The Seine river is frozen sufficiently to bear men and guns.

LONDON, Jan. 3.—A special correspondent of the Tribune, at Paris, sends letters and papers of the 31st ult. He says coal cannot be bought, as it has all been used for casting cannon, and by railroads and mills. Wood is nearly all gone. Trees of the Bois de Boulogne and the Boulevards are now being cut. Children are dying for want of milk. The total number of deaths for each of the last 2 weeks was 2,700. Bread is plentiful and is not rationed, and it is expected to last to the end of February. The Prussians threw shells further, their guns being of longer range than those of the French.

CHICAGO, Jan. 3.—The Journal's Washington special states, in a dispatch to the State Department, that Minister Washburn expressed the opinion that the surrender of Paris will not terminate the war. The French have at no stage of the struggle evinced greater determination. He thinks they will not submit so long as they have any men or money left. The Electeur Libre, of the 31st of Dec., demands more energetic military measures, and makes incessant attacks on the Provisional Government, and quotes Pays as saying the authorities show a sluggishness and hesitation.

LONDON, Jan. 2.—There was fighting on the 1st near the Swiss frontier. 400 French retreated into Switzerland, and were disarmed. There was a severe engagement on the 1st at Belle. Particulars unknown.

There are vague rumors at Lille of a battle on the 21, between the towns of Brisy and Bapaume, with heavy losses on both sides. The Prussians were defeated along the whole line.

Paris advices show that intense excitement prevails among the population, who demand to make a grand sortie. A number of mayors of the city have called upon Trochu, insisting that he will accede to their desire.

BORDEAUX, Jan. 4.—It is officially announced that Faidherbe sends the following dispatch, under date of the 3d. The battle near Bassanets, yesterday, lasted from 8 in the morning till 6 in the evening. I have driven the Prussians from all their positions and the villages held by them. The enemy's losses are numerous; guns are numerous.

LONDON, Jan. 4.—Amaluc made an enthusiastic entry into Madrid on Monday, proceeded to the Chambers, and took the oath. The enthusiasm is universal.

MADRID, Jan. 3.—The King consults Rusa, Garrano, Rivero and Ja-sago on the formation of a Constitutional Ministry.

LONDON, Jan. 4.—Austria sends Saurin to the Conference.


