Word was received Monday morning that five men had been badly injured by a belated blast in the Kennedy mine. The report was fortunately proved an exaggeration as far as the number of persons injured was concerned, and the serious nature of the injuries. It seems two men, both Italians, were working in the 2100 drift of the mine. They had exploded a number of holes, and started to return to the face, when another blast exploded, pieces of rock striking them on the face, cutting them considerably, but inflicting no dangerous wounds. The men hurt are DeLama and B. Navoni.

Violently Insane. Thomas O'Brien was brought up from Lone last Friday to be examined on a charge of insanity. He was violently crazy, and four men had to accompany him to the county seat, to guard against violence. That night he was taken to the hospital, but he was so dangerous and violent, that they were unable to manage him with the force there, so he was lodged in jail. On Monday he was examined by medical experts. He was taken before the court with his hands strapped together, as a precautionary measure. The present attack developed Sept. 20, but he had been previously committed for insanity. He is a native of Ireland, 43 years of age. The exciting causes of his mental unbalancing are alleged as indulgence in liquor and exposure to the sun. He was committed to Stockton asylum, and taken to that institution by deputy Kay Tuesday.

Violently Insane. Mrs. E. A. Cook, nee Augusta Bennetts, died in the Sacramento hospital on Friday last after a brief illness. Deceased was a daughter of Richard Bennetts of Amador City, and spent her girlhood days in that town, where she was endeared to all who knew her. A few months ago she was married to Mr. Cook in Sacramento who was also a resident of Amador City in bygone years, and a nephew of the late Geo. W. Kling. After marriage the par resided at Walnut Grove, where Mr. Cook is engaged in the butcher business, but he last enemy invaded the happy home, and carried the newly made bride to a premature grave. The remains were brought to Amador county and the funeral took place in Sutter Creek last Sunday, a large number of sorrowing relatives and friends following the remains to their last resting place. The bereaved relatives tender their heartfelt thanks to all who rendered aid in the final sickness and funeral ceremonies of their beloved one.

For Resisting an Officer. The case of People vs E. E. Letang charged with resisting an officer, was tried before justice Golden and a jury of eleven, on Tuesday last. The district attorney appeared for the prosecution, and C. H. Crocker for the defendant. This is one of those lamentable cases of criminal prosecution which occasionally disgrace the annals of our county. This ought to have been avoided by an understanding between the parties. Letang is the owner of the gas works. His pipe crosses the creek opposite the gasmeter, laid on the bedrock and anchored thereto. It has lain in the identical position it occupies to day for twenty years. No one ever dreamed in the years past that this three or four inch main was a nuisance by interfering with the natural flow of water. And as a matter of fact it does not now, and never did, interfere with the water way. Refuse and sewage in the creek did not accumulate and stagnate there. But parties wanted a ditch cut in the creek in the bedrock.

Letang testified in his own behalf. He admitted that he had filled up the ditch behind the man who was digging it, as he considered it was an injury to his property. He believed he had a right to protect his property. He did not lay hands on anyone or resist arrest. It would cost \$150 to lay the pipe in the bedrock at a lower point. The jury was out but a few minutes, when a verdict was returned of guilty. The court passed sentence this morning, imposing fine of \$100.

The case decisively settles nothing as to the real merits of the controversy. It does not settle the rights of Letang in the premises, or determine whether or not the officials have any right to invade a man's private property without notice or permission.
