

# PIONEER PASSES INTO FINAL REST

Former Resident of Jackson Died in Woodland

The Woodland Democrat of May 3, gives the following account of the death of a former resident and pioneer citizen of Jackson. The remains were brought to this city yesterday, and the funeral was held to-day, the body being deposited by his sorrowing relatives and friends in the family plot in the Catholic cemetery.

Sabato Nardini died this morning about 3 o'clock at his home on Main street. His death was due to lympho, a disease of the glands. About a year ago he was operated upon, and a growth was removed from the neck. Several months later the growth reappeared and spread with such rapidity that it baffled the efforts of the most skillful physicians. As a result he gradually began to decline. A week ago he took to his bed. Three days ago he suffered a paralytic stroke affecting his speech. On Monday morning he suffered a second stroke, which disabled his entire left side. He remained in a comatose condition all day and the greater portion of the night, and passed away peacefully this morning.

Mr Nardini was patient and uncomplaining during all his affliction. His suffering at times was intense, but he maintained his cheerful disposition to the last.

Deceased was born in Barga, Italy, on June 17, 1834. His parents died when he was of tender age. When a mere lad he left for England, where he engaged in artistic plaster of paris work, remaining there several years. In 1852 he came to the United States with his older brother, Joseph. He followed his trade in New York, Boston and other eastern cities until 1855, when attracted by the gold excitement in California, he started west. He first located at Placerville, and after remaining there a short time removed to Jackson, Amador county, where he engaged in mining. In July of 1884, Mr Nardini ceased

his mining operations, sold his property at Jackson, and came to Woodland. He leased a brick building on the corner of Third and Main street, a portion of which is now used by C. Murphy as a blacksmith shop, and conducted a lodging house and bar in the same. In 1898 he purchased the two-story brick structure across the street and ever since that time has conducted a hotel there under the name of the Toscana house.

Forty-one years ago Mr Nardini was married to Miss Marietta Massi. Nine children were born to them, six of whom are living. He is survived by his wife and the following children: Mrs Tilli Desano of Rocklin, Joseph C. Nardini, who is connected with the United States Immigration service at Los Angeles, Mrs Mary Benasin, Louis Nardini, Mrs Flora Cecchetini and Miss Emma Nardini of Woodland. Deceased also leaves one brother, Joseph, residing in Germany, and a nephew, A. Nardini, who is a wholesale commission merchant in San Francisco.

The death of Mr Nardini marks the passing of an old and respected resident. Until recently, he enjoyed robust health, due in a great measure, no doubt, to his temperate and methodical habits, and his cheerful disposition. He was quiet and unobtrusive and made it a practice to attend strictly to his own business. He was strictly honest in all his dealings with his fellow man, and his work was as good as his bond. He was a devoted husband, an indulgent and affectionate father, a loyal friend and good citizen. His family has the sympathy of the entire community.

## Went After Convention

The Foresters of America located in Jackson have sent as a delegate to the state convention of Foresters, which convened in Merced last Monday, a young man named Dufrene. Mr Dufrene at least realizes that Jackson is a fit place for a convention, and also that his lodge will receive its share of the glory and therefore went to the convention with the determination to bring the next meeting to his home town. As a booster, he had several hundred ribbons printed, which read, (Jackson 1911,) and these he distributed among the various delegates.


