Federal Prisoner Makes His Escape.

Reno, Nev.—William King, a federal prisoner sent from Elko county to await the action of the federal grand jury in Carson, cleverly slipped a pair of handcuffs from his wrists, and escaped at the Reno depot while being taken aboard the Virginia and Truckee train with sixteen other prisoners. His escape was not noticed until the other prisoners were in the car, and then he had disappeared.

King, with three other men, was sent from Elko on a charge of selling liquor to an Indian. In Reno there were thirteen other Federal prisoners awaiting a hearing. They were all handcuffed together yesterday, and were taken to the train by United States marshal Humphries, deputy Rockwell and guard McKabe. While the men were in a large crowd and the officers were endeavoring to get them in the train, King slipped the irons from his wrists and made his escape.

Oakland Now Has a Population of 156,000

Oakland.—According to the school census, completed, the population of Oakland is 156,000. Berkeley, according to the same census, has a population of 38,000 and Alameda a population of 23,380.

Kansas City.—Fourteen pretty babies, ranging in age from 18 months to 3 years, arrived at the Union depot from New York. Two nurses were in charge and they had more than they could do to get the babies to the Blossom house, where they were to spend the night. The nurses and depot employes carried the children into the depot, and the procession was followed by many women.

In the depot the little ones has many admirers. The sight of the fourteen fatherless and motherless infants touched the hearts of all who saw them, and the women, who sought the opportunity to fondle the youngsters, were unable to restrain their tears.

J. L. O'Hara of New York city, an agent for the Orphans' Home there, was in charge of the party. Two of the babies were left here. Six will go to Southwestern Kansas, and the others to Central and Western Kansas. An announcement was made in churches of the two Kansas cities that the babies would be here for adoption. Rose Stanish, 608 North Fifth street, Kansas City, Kan., was at the depot, and was given her choice.

Found Dead on Desert

Bakersfield—Dr. William A. Hogk, a graduate of Ann Arbor and well connected in Michigan, wandered out into Sand Canyon on the desert May 11th, and was found dead there. Hogk was

in charge of a hospital northeast of Mojave on the Los Angeles aqueduct. He is supposed to have tried to reach the railroad at Brown. In delirium he had stripped himself of all his clothing.

"Dead" Man Objects To Being Embalmed.

Deleware, O.—Isaac Thornton, a life long citizen of this city, was pronounced dead by his family and an undertaker was summoned. An hour later all arrangements were made to embalm the body.

After the undertaker had changed the position of Thornton, the man proved very much alive and remarked to the would-be embalmer that it might not be a bad thing to bring him a drink of water. When the undertaker came out of his trance brought on by the sudden words from a supposed dead man, the "corpse" was questioned as to what he meant by returning to life, and he stated that he had never felt in better health in all his days.

Victoria, B. C.—The body of a large panther, which tied up the street-car and electric-light service in Victoria when the animal jumped on the high tension wires, was turned over to a taxidermist for mounting to-day.
