A BIG TOW.

The steamer Old Reliable, on her last trip out of Green river had what is supposed to be the largest tow of lumber out of that river for some time. Her tow consisted of six barges of lumber aggregating 250,000 feet.

Part of this cargo is to be shipped over the I. C. railroad to distant points. One barge goes to Connecticut, but part of her tow is for local manufacturers.

She also had two coal boats with 2,400 bushels of coal. Low water doesn't affect the Old Reliable. She also has plenty of corn business along Green river to attend to. Captain Sauerheber expects to handle 43,000 bushels from points below Henderson Ky., alone. This goes to the Henderson Elevator company via the Illinois Central railroad. Captain Sauerheber is pilot and captain of the Old Reliable and George J. Jake is engineer.—Evansville Courier.
