PROMINENT GUEST CHARGES COERCION

CONGRESSMAN RANDELL, OF LOUISIANA, FAVORS CAIRO WITH A VISIT.

From St. Louis With Mississippi River Commission—Spends Afternoon as Guest of Mayor Parsons and Meets Citizens.

Congressman Joseph Eugene Randell came down from St. Louis yesterday on the government steamer Mississippi, with the Mississippi River Commission, and remained here till about 9 o'clock last night, the guest of Mayor George Parsons, at his home on Twenty-eighth street, where he met a number of leading citizens. He returned to St. Louis last night by rail.

Congressman Randell is one of the most prominent figures at the national capital. He has represented the Fifth Louisiana District in congress since 1899 and is a leading member of the committee on Rivers and Harbors. The object of his visit was to familiarize himself with conditions between St. Louis and Cairo, especially at this point and vicinity, coming here upon a special invitation extended to him by Mayor Parsons while attending the St. Louis convention.

Mr. Randell is a firm friend of river improvement and expressed himself while here as heartily in favor of ample and regular appropriations so as to permit the steady and rapid improvement of the great rivers. He favors also the Illinois canal or "Lakes to the Gulf" proposition.

NO BLOOD FOR HIM

Guchkoff at Octoberists Meeting Opposes Doctrine of Constitutional Democrats.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 18.—A. J. Guchkoff, presiding today at the general meeting of Octoberists, attended by 5,000 persons, said the approaching election will disclose a clearer comprehension of the political situation.

"Let those who wish to obtain civil rights by revolution and destruction of the fatherland vote for the Constitutional Democrats and other members of the left," said the speaker.

JUROR IN MACKIN WILL CASE CLAIMS HE WAS SUBJECTED TO INTIMIDATION.

Told Judge He Would Not Have Signed Verdict If It Had Been Otherwise—New Trial Is Ordered.

Rock Island, Ill., Nov. 18.—J. S. Rogers, of Moline, a juror in the Mackin will contest, which closed yesterday, with a verdict for the contestants, complained to Judge W. H. Gest, who heard the case in the circuit court, that he had been intimidated and coerced into signing the verdict. He was told the complaint should have been made before the verdict was returned. Rogers sought the states attorney and lawyers for the proponents of the will, but no steps have been taken yet as a result.

For unaccountable reasons the proponents failed to have the juror polled when the verdict was returned. They say they will not present an affidavit from Rogers to secure the setting aside of the verdict, but it is possible it will be furnished and be argument for a new trial.

It is generally understood that the beneficiaries who sought to keep the will in force, among them Mrs. Charles A. Plamondon of Chicago, will not end their fight, but will either make an effort to secure a new trial here or in an adjoining county, or will take the case to the higher courts.

Other jurors than Rogers in the case will say little of the proceedings in the jury room, but it is said that one reflected on his honesty and urged he be ignored.

BODIES OF DEAD BURNED TO CRISP

REAR-END COLLISION NEAR FULTON ON ILLINOIS CENTRAL RAILROAD.

KILL TWO INSTANTLY WILL RECOVER LANDS

Three Others Fatally Injured—Heavy Engine With Caboose Dashes Around Curve Into Local Train.

Fulton, Ky., Nov. 18.—As the result of a rear-end collision between a light engine and local mixed train 193, just south of this place, this afternoon, on the I. C. Railroad, two men were instantly killed, three injured, perhaps fatally, and a number of passengers were more or less hurt.

The Dead. Will Scott, white, flagman, of Huntsville, Ala. Unknown passenger.

Dangerously Injured. A. K. Abernathy, conductor of 193, of Fulton, Ky.; will die.

John Craig Morris, civil engineer, of Fulton, Ky.; legs broken and body lacerated.

A. S. Posey, of Hennig, Tenn.; eye knocked out and body crushed.

The engine, one of the enormous new type of the I. C. Railway, with caboose attached, ran out of a curve into the rear of the local and completely telescoped the latter.

Scott's body and that of the unidentified passenger were caught under the wreckage and burned to a crisp. It is feared that several more bodies are under the engine and it will not be known until tomorrow the exact number killed.

The passengers of the local were without intimation of the approach of the engine and were caught like rats in a trap.

BABE IS HURLED TO DEATH BY TOPPLING OVER OF HIGH CHAIR IN WHICH IT WAS SITTING.

Thrown Into Blazing Fire in Grate Where Another Infant Perished Thirteen Years Ago—Mother Absent at Time.

Marion, Ill., November 18.—News reached this city tonight of the horrible death met by a small child at the home of its parents south of this city this evening. Mrs. Morton Garley fled her eight-months-old baby in a high chair and placed the chair before an open grate. The mother left the room for a few minutes, and when she returned found her little one lying on the hot embers of the fire slowly roasting alive. The baby's eyes were burned out of their sockets and the flesh dropped from his face. Even with this it lived for two hours before death released it from its awful misery.

The mother has lost her reason, and friends fear that she will take her life in her madness. The father is a prominent farmer of this section.

A weird coincidence connected with the accident is that just 13 years ago, lacking six days, an eight-months-old baby of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Heck was burned to death in the same manner from the same cause and in the same grate.

RAN FOR A DOCTOR

Burglar Assists Woman Who Accidentally Shot Herself in Repelling Him.

Glasgow, Ky., Nov. 18.—A burglar going for a physician that the woman accidentally shot when he was breaking into her home might not die, is reported from Hardin county.

Matt Sandige, a cripple, and his wife were awakened by the burglar's movements. Sandige and his wife picked up fire arms conveniently adjacent and commanded the intruder to depart. He declined, and the couple began firing. Mrs. Sandige's skirt caught on the trigger of her gun and the load entered her right thigh.

"For God's sake, call a doctor!" Sandige cried to the burglar. The marauder departed at once, and within a short time a physician arrived, saying he had been summoned by a stranger. Mrs. Sandige's recovery is considered doubtful.

STOLE MILLIONS OF COAL LANDS

U. P. RAILROAD AND COAL CO. ASSISTED BY GOVERNMENT LAND OFFICE.

WILL RECOVER LANDS

Stole From Wyoming Through Proceedings—President Roosevelt Made Acquainted With Situation.

Washington, Nov. 18.—Affidavits are on file with the government here and have been called to the attention of President Roosevelt charging that the gigantic land frauds whereby the Union Pacific Railroad company and the Union Pacific Coal company are said to have stolen coal lands in the state of Wyoming, which are valued at many millions of dollars, were perpetrated with the full knowledge of the government land office, if not with its connivance and were known, if not tacitly assented to by the department of the interior.

The affidavits are made by Artemus J. Smith, of Smith & Bradbury, dealers in mines and mining, at Denver, Colo. The papers are supplemental to a petition and other affidavits, which were filed by Smith with the land office in Washington early in 1903 and they make a demand on the department to start proceedings for the recovery of all the lands illegally obtained. The charges made by Smith call into question the integrity of William A. Richards, government land commissioner, and of others high in the employ of the government. It was the knowledge of the earlier charges made by Smith which led to the investigation by the Interstate Commerce Commission, recently made at Salt Lake City and at Denver, and by which fraudulent land deals of great magnitude were uncovered.

In pursuing the investigation the Interstate Commerce Commission was exceedingly careful not to uncover the fact that these deals and all the details connected with them, together with names and dates and amounts paid for perjury, had been in the possession of the department of the interior for more than three years. Acting under the suggestion of government officials the commission carefully avoided exposing or making an attack upon a co-ordinate branch of the government. Emboldened by the disclosures of the commission, Smith again has appealed to the department of the interior for justice, declaring that he has a prospective interest in the lands in question, and that he desires to assert and protect this interest.
