Was Not Afraid.

"I thank you very much for your letter, but I have no fear of going out alone. I don't think anyone would do me any harm, unless he was a lunatic, and it is hard to guard against lunatics."

Gallagher, judging by his appearance, is no lunatic. His mind is apparently as sound as any man's fifty odd years of age, but he has nourished hatred for Gaynor ever since he was discharged as night watchman in the department of docks and ferries in July last, for incompetency. Since then he has repeatedly written anonymously and otherwise harping on the obsession that he had been persecuted, and demanding redress. He had even written the governor, and went aboard the Kaiser today, with the express purpose of murdering the mayor.

"You took the bread and butter out of my mouth," he shouted as he approached the mayor, then he leveled the revolver and fired.



The Cairo Dredging Company contract covers all the unfilled streets from Douglas to Twenty-first, west of Walnut street. This contract has been hanging fire for three years and would have been filled years ago had the Dredging Co. not been unfortunate in the uncertain operation of their plant in the beginning, and the loss of their dredge boat as the final "straw." The company have about given up the work of having the work done in a modern manner and will have to resort to the old style manner of hauling the dirt by the use of teams and wagons.
