Good Contributors

The last issue of "Anpao kin"
was the annual Convocation num-
ber, which gives an exhibit of the
contributions of all the Episcopal
churches on the Indian reserva-
tions of South Dakota (including
the Santees) for the preceding
year, showing how the various
sums were used. The grand total
for the past year was \$434.36, an
increase of \$233.28 over the pre-
