"LOG" OF "THE EVERGLADES"

The Stiles Family Successfully Reach Pierre

The Press owes its readers an apology, or excuse, this week for the late appearance of the paper; and the excuse we have to offer is the following "story," which is also a news-item:

Our houseboat visitors, aboard the "Everglades," resumed their journey on Friday last, but had only gone about half a mile when their engine got out of order, and they decided to stop a while to repair it. An accident had also occurred to Mr. Stiles Sr, a pike-pole striking him in the eye. This accident, it was feared might have a fatal termination; but Dr. Walsh of Ft-Pierre prescribed a treatment for him which he said would cure the eye in two to three weeks time.

Monday noon the boat was ready to start again, from a point about two miles below town. Two residents of the City were again on hand for the purpose of bidding the voyageurs goodbye, viz: Messrs. Marshall Eidam and E. P. Thorne; but this purpose was turned into an invitation to accompany them at least as far as Pierre. As for ye Editor, it didn't take him but a few minutes to decide that this was the opportunity to explore the mysterious depths of Missouri river "terrors" that he had been hoping and wishing for, for lo! these many years, and he immediately hiked back to town with his canoe to inform his typographical force that he was going sailing and that he was liable not to be back for a whole week.

And Marshall, he decided he wasn't going to be outdone by an editor. Of this, however, Mr. Editor was not aware until Marshall appeared on the scene, the second time, with his bicycle, just as the orders "All aboard" had been given by Capt. Stiles.

On account of an inkling that the pleasures and satisfaction of the voyage will afford us mighty good material for a "serial story," we shall not attempt to give a further sketch in this issue, but instead will give our readers a copy of the "good ship's" "log," as follows:

Started, high noon.
3:07 p.m., landed on Lafferty island for a visit,
3:40 stopt on account os high wind.
5:07 started again
6: passed C. B. Rosa ranch
7:20 passed Ed Sutton ranch
7:50 struck sandbar, delayed about twentyfive minutes
8:45 stopt for supper, three miles below Sutton ranch. Stiff breeze blowing
Tues. June 8—9:30 a.m., breakfast. Light breeze blowing
10: started,
10:45 made a call on Mrs. Cass, (niece of E. P. Thorne) mile above Fairbank
12:30 m. visited Spencer irrigated farm, Fairbank P.O.; 27 miles below Forest City
2 p. m. stopt opposite neck of Little Bend, near Amede Rousseau ranch, for dinner. 36 miles.
2:50 started again
5: passed mouth of Cheyenne river, 46 miles

6:30 passed Little Bend P. O.
8:15 stopt for night opposite FtBennet, 56 miles

Wed. June 9—6:20 a.m. started.
7:30 stopt for breakfast opposite site of old Fort Sully, wind too strong for further running
5:30 p. m. started again, wind down

7:25 stopt for night about 5 miles above Oahe. Camp near Mr. A.C. Caldwell, wood-yard man of Pierre, and friend, who were fishing and logging. Got a fine mess of fish: eel, pike and catfish. 76 miles.

Thurs. June 10—6 a.m. started; ate breakfast without stopping.

9: stopt 10 miles above Ft-Pierre to take photo of herd of buffalo 13 head; also saw two others. Shortly afterward passed the pumping station of the Scotty Phillip irrigated ranch.

12 m. landed at foot of Pierre-st Pierre. 94 miles.

Ye Editor returned Friday via Gettysburg. Marshall was to return cross country on his bicycle but at the hour of our going to press—Sat. 4 p. m.—had not yet returned.


