LIGHTNING STARTS FIRE

Heavy Rain Raises Missouri River Nearly a Foot.

Tuesday evening the heaviest rain of the month visited this section of the state, commencing at 5 p. m. and lasting till after dark. There was some hail with it in Forest City, but no reports have been received of any damage being done.

At the Agency the government carpenter shop was struck by lightning, and set on fire, but a fortunate circumstance, with an efficient fire department, prevented a great amount of damage.

Mr Johnson was one of the first to discover it, as he was standing in the veranda of the old hospital, a few minutes after the flash of lightning, which struck the southwest corner of the building, going straight down thru to the ground. A tool case some six feet high stood in this corner.

The ceiling was ablaze when the firemen arrived, in response to Mr. Johnson's alarm, but this was soon extinguished. The damage is estimated to amount to about \$300 consisting mostly of some three hundred feet of belting, windows, etc. Of the dozen or so machines in the room, practically none were damaged.

From appearance of the clouds north and northwest, a much heavier rain went down the Missouri and perhaps Grand river, crossing the Missouri at Lebeau and Moberge. Indications of loss of live stock somewhere up river were seen in a sheep carcass that came down during the night and lodged on the submerged sandbar in front of the Agency.

An opinion has just been rendered by the attorney-general of South Dakota regarding the question recently raised by some of the snp'ts of Indian schools as to the constitutionality of the new law forbidding Indian children to attend public schools.

The opinion holds it lawful for the children of Indians who are voters and taxpayers, even tho still receiving govt-annuities, to have all the privileges of the public schools in their respective districts and counties, the same as white children.

Another opinion holds that the Indian school property at Rapid City is exempt from taxation, and the Indian children living on a reservation surrounding an Indian school are entitled to the same school privileges as white children if their parents have severed their tribal relations.


