## OFFICIAL INSPECTION

Of Beaver Gulch Section of Red and Yellow Trail

Hon. Homer A. Derr, State Engineer, accompanied by Vern Dorothy, assistant chaff, came up from Pierre Monday evening, remaining over night. They are making a tour of the artesian basin of the state, under a provision of the last legislature, to make investigations with a view to the conservation of the artesian waters of the state. He will make a report of the results of his work to Gov. Byrne, who will present the matter to the legislature in his next biennial message. An effort was made at the last legislature to frame a law haying for its object the conservation of our artesian waters, but our solons thought they did not have sufficient light yet on the subject, so they appropriated \$1500 for the expenses of the present investigation.

Mr. Derr stated that he had been requested by our county commissioners to make another trip up Beayer Gulch and give them a report on the work still necessary to be done there. Consequently they went up the gulch Tuesday morning, to go from there to Ed Sutton's past George Comeau's. Thence they were to go east and north via Gettysburg to Roscoe and vicinity.

Another good word and deed for the "Red and Yellow Trail."

In this connection the editor of The Press has a report to make. Last Friday, while on a trip to Gettysburg, he really had the pleasure of seeing our worthy county commissioners, Messrs. Williams, VonWald and Rausch, at work on our highway to the countyseat. They are grading and improving a stretch six miles long westward from the 'burg, a token that the "Red and Yellow Trail" is not going to lose any of its good reputation in comparison with the other three cross-state highways.

The Potter County News of last week contained another "Mud" story—that word being the title of the article—but the scene was laid up north, on the much-boasted "Black and Yellow Trail" between Aberdeen and Mobridge. ## PROHIBITION DOES PROHIBIT

Capital City Brewing Company of Indianapolis Finds That It Does So Effectually.

Indianapolis, Ind., June 19.—That prohibition does prohibit is the testimony of the Capital City Brewing company of this city. Representatives of the company yesterday appeared before the board of equalization to ask that their assessment be materially reduced. In support of their petition they claimed that the spread of prohibition during the past few years has greatly reduced the value of brewing stock. Reginald Sullivan, receiver for the company, declared that he receives letters every day from breweries in states that have gone dry begging him to buy their equipment at 10 cents on the dollar. Mr. Sullivan declared that the equipment for a brewery of 50,000 barrels annual capacity could be bought for \$5,000.

On the strength of these representations the board reduced the assessments of the Capital City company from \$49,300 to \$28,000.

## CHARGE IT UP TO LIQUOR

There are 4,400 unfortunates sent to the Minneapolis workhouse every year. Superintendent McDonald, who has been at the head of the institution for ten years, says in that time 30,000 persons have been brought to him and that NINETY-TWO PER CENT OF THE INMATES ARE BROUGHT THERE BY THE LIQUOR ROUTE.

That means that were it not for saloons and the liquor traffic, instead of the inmates numbering 4,400 a year they would number but 352. Think of the lessened expense of maintenance and then think of the diminished costs of the courts whose time is principally taken up in hearing the cases, to say nothing of the increased number of happy homes and manly men, were the saloon abolished and the curse of drink eradicated.


