## INDIAN FAIR SEPT. 24 to 26

New Buildings, Larger Premiums and other Attractions for Fair to be held at Chey. Agency

The announcement comes from the Indian Office that the Indian Fair for the Chey. River reservation is to be held again at the Agency, commencing on Sept. 24 and lasting for three days. A new building is to be erected for the stock exhibit, which will make two stock buildings, besides the Agricultural Hall. The government has donated \$300 to be paid for premiums, and also \$500 for beef rations to be distributed to Indian visitors.

In addition to these sums, the lessees of the reservation have also promised a liberal contribution for premiums, besides a number of other persons. It is expected that more liberal premiums will be paid than were paid last year.

The government has also provided for an Indian exhibit at the State Fair, which was such a success last year.
