OBITUARY

MRS. B.P. HOOVER

The subject of the following sketch was well known in and around Forest City, she with other members of her father's family having originally settled in this place. Our limited space prevents us from quoting the article entire, which is from the Potter County News:

"For her the last few years have not been easy. Ill health overtook her several years ago and since that time she has endured pain almost continually. Early in the summer she made several trips to Rochester and it was when she returned the last time, several weeks ago, that it was known she would not go again; for the doctors told her that they could do no more. Since then, surrounded by those who loved her most, she has gradually faded away, until death mercifully came to relieve her suffering.

"Mrs. Hoover was born in Maine, in South Portland, about fifty years ago. In the late eighties she came to Potter county with a party of eastern people, among whom were several members of her family. The family settled at Forest City and were closely identified with the early fortunes of that community. After a few years in South Dakota Mrs Hoover with other members of her immediate family spent a few years in Chicago, returning later to Potter county. About 1897 they moved to Gettysburg.

"Mrs. Hoover has always been a busy woman. She taught school at times and worked in offices and stores. From 1898 to 1900 she served as county superintendent of schools for Potter county and in 1900 was candidate for state Sup't of pub-

lic instruction on the democratic ticket. About ten years ago she was married to Ben P. Hoover and from that time until a few months ago assisted regularly in the business in which Mr. Hoover was engaged.

"Mrs. Hoover was always active in the work of the ladies' literary club, where, as a woman of unusually good education, she was one of the leaders. She was also an active member of various lodges.

Funeral services were held at the home Friday afternoon. Rev. R. P. Eubanks, pastor of the Episcopal church, had charge of the services. The body was laid to rest in the Gettysburg cemetery beside that of her sister Edith who passed away several years ago.

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
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PROPOSED AMENDMENT (18th)

To the Constitution of the United States of America:

No state or territory shall pass any law licensing or authorizing the sale of intoxicating liquors or narcotic drugs, for beverage purposes, or habitual use, and the sale and manufacture of all intoxicants and narcotics intended for such use, in the insular and other possessions of the United States, shall be forever prohibited.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT (19th)

To the Constitution of the United States of America:

The right of the Congress to construct, own or maintain interstate and international railways shall not be denied or abridged; but the United States shall not become a common carrier by the ownership or operation of any "rolling stock" on such, or other, railways; except that this provision may be suspended by the Congress for and during time of war only.
