

## GREAT OPPORTUNITY

### For Our Red Neighbors to Improve Breed of Horses

A recent issue of the Eagle Butte News gives the following account of an enterprise that would be called government "paternalism" if such a thing should be done for an equal number of white people. The work was started some five years ago, and already a larger and better grade of horses on the reservation:

"A News representative visited the government horse breeding station four miles southwest of Eagle Butte, Wednesday, and was shown over the place by Major Campbell, superintendent of Cheyenne Indian reservation, and A.C. Wells, in charge of the station. This horse breeding station is the result of a co-operative arrangement between the War Department, Bureau of Animal Industry and the Indian Department, and the object is to breed the type of horse required for artillery and cavalry purposes and thus provide a market for this class of horses raised by the Indians who take advantage of this opportunity afforded him to improve the quality of his increase, the arrangement being for the war department to buy all the colts sired by these stallions that will pass inspection when three years old. The stallions were selected by the War Department with a view to their adaptability for this purpose and are the best obtainable. There are four Percherons, two light standard bred, and two saddle bred, and each is a superior individual of its class.

"By locating them at this central point on the reservation, all together, the Indian has the advantage of breeding to the most suitable type, this feature being one that will result in greatest profit to him in the shortest time.

The type of horse required by the War Department is not here and this method is taken to revive the breed, and those who take advantage of the opportunity to breed up their horses from these blue-blooded sires will soon be in a position to reap rich returns for their foresight.

In addition to modern buildings the station has a pasture of about 10,000 acres fenced which provides adequate range for the large number of mares held during the season without expense to owners, and as time goes by and the Indian gets a clearer realization of the benefits that can be derived by him from this project he will develop into a booster for the horse breeding station and will profit from it more than from any other branch of departmental service yet instituted for his benefit in the reservation country."

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

## So. Dak. Local Option League and Chicago Brewers Association Spring a New Fake

Recently the South Dakota Local Option League published over the state in newspaper advertisements one of the most brazen fakes ever perpetrated. Simultaneously, the Chicago Brewers Association put out the identical "bunk" in newspapers of Illinois. The following is the bogus advertisement put out by these two concerns:

The above advertisement is a cheat and a lie. No such statistics exist and never did exist. The fake has been foisted upon the people jointly and simultaneously by the Chicago Brewers Association and the South Dakota Local Option League.

## The Truth and the Proof of it

Instead of there being 568 arrests for drunkenness in Denver during the first six months of 1916, the dry regime, *there were only 530.*

**Instead of there being only 136 arrests for drunkenness in Denver during the corresponding six months of last year when the city was wet, there were actually 1342 such arrests, almost ten times as many as is claimed by the South Dakota Local Option League and the Chicago Brewers Association.**

On September 7, J. S. Hoagland, President of the South Dakota Anti Saloon League telegraphed Chief of Police Armstrong in Dever asking for the true statistics and received the following reply.
