**THE COUNCIL PETITIONED**

The destructive fire at Goodall has been a lesson that Daytona should profit by. We would better facilities for fighting fire. A good fire department would mean cheaper insurance rates. It would greatly increase the value of real estate, and add still another inducement to the many already offered by Daytona to home-seekers.

The Goodall fire has not aroused feeling of amusement and concern among our business men, and as a result Dr. W. E. French was yesterday circulating the following petition among business men which is being generally signed:

To the Honorable Council of the City of Daytona, Fla.

Gentlemen: We the undersigned citizens and taxpayers of Daytona hereby petition your honorable body to provide at once a suitable fire alarm bell to be placed on the city. To provide the chief of the fire department with a bell connected with the central telephone office.

We further petition that you order an election for the purpose of determining whether the city shall be bonded for a sum sufficient to provide a suitable and every thing sufficient for a first-class fire water works and adequate fire protection.

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**BIG FIRE IN GOODALL**

About 2 o'clock Wednesday morning a destructive fire broke out in the Long-cottages on Shawnee avenue, Goodall.

Aided by a brisk wind it quickly spread to nearby buildings and destroyed G. P. Dow's restaurant and E. G. Kittredge's residence on the south side of the avenue, and from the latter building it creased over to the north side and destroyed the residence and grocery store of O. M. Brown & Bro. and three other minor buildings.

The houses on the south side were all owned by E. G. Kittredge, and those on the north side by A. S. Harroun.

The Seaside Inn was badly scorched, and was only saved by hard work. It is a coincidence worthy of note that just four years to a day had elapsed since the old Seaside Inn was totally destroyed by fire.

The total loss by Wednesday morning's fire is estimated at \$12,500, with \$4,500 insurance. It is distributed as follows: G. P. Dow, \$500; no insurance. E. G. Kittredge, \$5,000; ins. \$2,500. A. S. Harroun, \$3,000; ins. \$2,000. Brown & Bro. \$3,000; no insurance.

The fire was unquestionably of incendiary origin, as the cottage where it first started was unoccupied and has been vacant for some time.

O. M. Brown, whose grocery was on the opposite side of the avenue from the cottage, was first to discover the fire. He threw open the window of his room and looked out, and just then he saw a man dart from behind the burning cottage and run toward the beach. About the same time the colored porter of the Seaside Inn ran into the street and began to yell "fire! fire!" He says he also saw the man running from the burning building toward the beach. "The man," said the porter, "called out to me to shut my door, black mouth and go back to the hotel. I couldn't see whether he was a black or a white man."

**\$100 REWARD OFFERED**

At the meeting of the County Commissioners last Monday evening a reward of \$100 was offered for the capture of the negro who assaulted Miss Kruse over a week ago. A traveling man who was here Monday says that one day last week he noticed a negro over at the Atlantic Coast Line, near De Land Junction, that answered the description of Miss Kruse's assailant and carried a banjo. The man had not then heard of the assault, but when he read of it in the Gazette-News and noted the description given of the brutal criminal, his mind immediately reverted to the negro he had noticed.

**THE GET-RICH-QUICKERS**

During the summer the Hotel Douglas will be enlarged to twice its present size which will make it the largest hotel in Daytona.

John C. Howard, of Summerville, Mass. has purchased of W. H. Peters a lot on Beach street and 100 feet of the Walter property on Volusia avenue. Mr. Howard will erect a commodious brick building on the river front of the property.

The docks will be enlarged and much improved during the summer. It is still not overbuilding, there being forty-five new arrivals last week. Under the management of Mrs. Silvermail, the docks have become one of the most popular hotels in Daytona. Its increasing business makes enlargement a necessity.

**COUNTY SOLARS MEETING**

Printing of Delinquent Tax List Awarded the Du Gasette-News.

The County Commissioners met at DeLand Monday evening, finishing their work and adjourning at noon Tuesday.

The road reports show considerable work during the month. On motion R. P. Walters was granted permission to lay a tramroad along the county road from DeLand to Glenwood, to be of the same type as the one now used by John B. Stetson, and is to be laid under the direction of Commissioner Bond. A petition for the discontinuance of a road running from Halifax avenue in the Hong Addition, to Daytona, was presented and granted. Commissioner Bond was appointed a special committee to arrange with the Florida Naval Stores Company for the sinking of a public well at the Half Way Place on the Daytona and DeLand road. The assessed value of the Putnam House in DeLand was reduced for the year 1902 to equalize an overvaluation for 1902 and Warren Winkler was allowed a reduction in the valuation of his lot at Seabreeze for the same reason. The Daytona Gazette-News was given the tax list for this year. A reward of \$100 was ordered to be offered for the arrest and conviction of a negro named Jesse Kilpatrick, for an assault committed at Daytona.

**COUNTY SCHOOL BOARD**

The regular monthly meeting of the county school board met at DeLand Tuesday. All the members of the board and the County Superintendent were in attendance. Sub-district election were ordered to be held on the 30th of May to elect trustees and fix the amount of the special tax for the ensuing two years in the precincts of DeLand, Port Orange, Ormond, Person, Enterprise, Orange City, Emporia and Seville. The resignation of W. H. Porter as teacher at Silver Lake was accepted.

A communication was received from Port Orange regarding the destruction of school house property which was referred to Commissioner Knappe for his investigation. A petition for a more liberal appropriation for the State Institution for the Deaf and Blind was adopted and ordered sent to the members of the Legislature.
