**"RACE SUICIDE"**

Some time ago President Roosevelt, who seems to have a penchant for airing his opinions on both public and private questions, suggested the remote danger of "race suicide" lurking in the fact that the tendency toward marriage is on the wane, and the presence of large families the exception where it was the rule a century ago.

His criticism of the thrift of American mothers along this line has attracted wide attention and provoked much comment, pro and con.

The Pennsylvania Legislature proposed to offer a premium for mothers of large families, and all along the route of the President's Western political junket, the mothers of large broods are flocking to the railway stations with the whole bunch of kids to let Teddy give them his doubtful blessing.

Red Smoot, the Mormon Senator from Utah, hastens to commend the President for his interest in large families, and takes the occasion to "point with pride" to the fact that Brigham Young was the father of a brood of 62 children, while the descendants of old Joe Smith, founder of the Mormon Church, now number over one thousand.

On the other hand, former Governor Pattison, of Pennsylvania, is disposed to see in the President's utterances only the spirit of governmental paternalism. In a recent speech, Mr. Pattison says:

"To-day we have reached the zenith of centralization in business and politics. What Jefferson feared and Cleveland fought has grown until commercialism and paternalism have succeeded patriotism. President Roosevelt, in his extreme paternalism, has attempted to prescribe the limits of the American family."

At a recent convention of the Western New York Society of Old Maids, held at Pittsford, N. Y., "the world turned," so to speak, and the old maids handed Teddy without gloves. Miss Amelia Higginson, president of the Society, said:

"President Roosevelt believes in the rearing of large families; he has a right to his opinion, but when he places childlessness in the same category with criminal acts, he goes too far. The President is the father of what we Americans call a large family. We have heard nothing about 'race suicide' from the mothers of America, and we never shall."

Another indignant spinster grappled the question in this vigorous fashion:

"Let the President grapple with the trusts, the tariff, and the coming election. They are more in his line. He can easily leave the question of babies in the hands of the women of this great republic."

**THE TREND OF THE PARVENU**

Dr. Donald S. Mackay, the famous New York Presbyterian divine, does not take a very roseate view of the moral future of this country. In a recent sermon he comments on the trend of modern society in a rather gloomy and drastic fashion. He declares that—

"New York becomes every evening a vast Vanity Fair, where irrational and too often degraded pleasure lures men and women by the thousand to its gilded shrine, and before that shrine high-thinking and plain-living are nightly immolated. The poor man, unable to share in these extravaganzas, chafes beneath the restrictions, and hatred of his pampered betters bites at the ropes of separation. The secret of simple life and Christian purity are mysteries the rich can neither learn or comprehend. They have lived too long in the cellar of their appetites; the very rock of the kitchen is in their brains. They must die as they have lived—in the tyranny of those tastes which their surroundings have stimulated."

There is a great deal of truth in this dark picture. High living and disregard of moral principles destroyed the Roman Empire, and the easy and hedonistic masses against the rich and privileged classes of France, who ignored justice and laughed to scorn the principle of inherited human rights, brought about the French Revolution, enthroning anarchy and opening the guillotine.

In the doings of the parvenu society of New York, where a man may be raised in full evening dress was the central feature of a disgusting banquet, followed by a "horse-dinner," the observer at hand may easily discern the ghost of Roman immolation; and in the latter-day method "government by injunction" looks the grim shadow of the guillotine.

**PASSING OF THE DEMAGOGUE**

The St. Augustine Record calls attention to the fact that J. M. Barrs, the one tribunician of Florida Democracy, seems to regard every Democratic newspaper that does not support him as a purchasable commodity. Says the Record:

"In his announcement, Mr. Barrs uses the pronoun I 52 times, my 26 times, me four times, while the word 'our' occurs but once. Mr. Barrs is the whole thing."

Then, we are all in the market place, according to Barrs, for his candidacy for Congress has not been endorsed by a solitary newspaper in the district, so far as we have been able to observe. On the contrary, most of them have given him a deserved and unmerciful roasting.

Florida is not now nor has it ever been ruled by corporations. Flieger, Plant, Clyde, Chipley, and other representatives of corporation interests, have made the State what it is to-day—the veritable garden-spot of the South. But they do not rule it. What they have done was not done for the sake of the people of the State. Their motives were mainly selfish, but in helping themselves, they have necessarily helped the people. Such a result is inevitable when proper restrictions are legally hedged around corporate investments.

Mr. Barrs can win no votes nor arouse any enthusiasm by a demagogic appeal to an unthinking prejudice against corporations. The plain people have begun to do a little thinking for themselves, and they realize that there is less danger now of corruption here than at any time in post-bellum history of Florida.

The sensible people of the State are entirely willing that Mr. Flieger and every other capitalist of the State shall help themselves just as long as they continue to develop the resources of Florida—and they realize that by putting them in the vanguard of progress and prosperity.
