DO WE NEED SEWERS?

Editor Gazette-News: St. Augustine for more than three hundred years has been built up more compactly than Daytona ever will be. Before Daytona was a village St. Augustine had more inhabitants than Daytona has now.

"A report that the place was unhealthy, or in a bad sanitary condition, would harm us. After St. Augustine has established a sewerage system there will be plenty of time for us to discuss the question as to the necessity of one here. Why did not our committee tell us about St. Augustine as well as Brunswick?"

Would it not be better for us to follow the example of St. Augustine, whose credit and reputation is of the best, rather than that of Brunswick whose bonds even at the time of issue were not worth more than '60 cents on the dollar' owing to poor municipal government?"

"If it was a 'poor municipal government' that floated the Brunswick sewer bonds what shall we call the municipal government that tries to follow their example?"

"Has the fact existing that all precautions had been taken to preserve the public health" given Brunswick any 'prestige' or 'increased the flow of tourists and home-seekers?' Why 'take all precautions to presume' that which is in no danger? We have been told that disease germs would get into our artesian water through rust holes in the pipes, out of which water would be pouring with a pressure of five to ten pounds to the inch. If they can swim against such current they will swim up our sewers from the river and be in wait for us in our bath tubs and wash bowls.

Northern investors will not be driven away by 'effete matter in the soil' but they will be by excessive taxation.

COUNTY SCHOOL BOARD.

The Board of Public Instruction met at DeLand Monday and Tuesday. Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Superintendent instructed to furnish supplies for Barberville school. Superintendent instructed to employ assistant teachers at Orange City and Oak Hill, if the Trustees would pay one-half of the salary.

Upon petition George Richardson was appointed Supervisor of McGlenn School No. 4.

Superintendent was instructed to supply teachers' desks for Braddock and Port Orange schools, and desks for Holly Hill, Daytona and Braddock school.

Ed Smith was granted permission to patronize Daytona school. Resignation of Nellie Mann as assistant at Pierson was accepted, and she was appointed teacher at Emporia.

The action of the Superintendent in appointing Miss Carrie B. Boyd assistant at Ormond, upon resignation of Miss Fannie Brantley was approved. Wm. Fagan and John Smith, of Ormond, appeared before the Board in behalf of the Ormond patrons.

Treasurer's books were presented, audited and found correct.

Old warrants were cancelled and new bills were ordered paid.

The Board adjourned until the first Monday in December.
