Why Not For Daytona.

Advices were received here today stating that a reduction in freight rates on certain goods from Jacksonville to Miami would become effective on the 17th of this month. According to the wire received, the rate on canned goods heretofore 73 cents per hundred weight will now be 50 cents; sugar will be reduced from 61 cents to 40 cents per hundred weight and grain from 31 cents to 25 cents. The reduction is made only to Miami and is the result of the competition of the many schooners sailing to this port.—Miami Evening Record.

The First Shipment of Oranges.

The first oranges to be shipped from Daytona this season went forth by express Tuesday. They were shipped by William Bellamy, to Lyon Brothers, of New York. The fruit is good, and the prices that the Halifax river oranges bring is considerable more than the average price of oranges. There will be shipped from here many thousands of boxes this season, and the gathering and preparing for shipment of this fruit will turn loose considerable money in the neighborhood.

BEACH IN FINE SHAPE.

From the Jacksonville Times-Union.

The Florida East Coast Automobile Association states that the new well-known automobile speed course, the Daytona-Ormond beach, is in better shape than it has been for years, and that records at the next tournament will surely fall before the visitors, as the improvements in the racing automobile warrant the belief that they are at least five to ten seconds faster than they were last year.

A good deal of curiosity has been shown as to why the Daytona-Ormond beach is so fast, and what are the properties that made it fast for automobile speeding.

It was explained the other day by John Anderson, of Ormond, who stated that the secret of the hardness of the beach which has made it totally different from other beaches, is that the little coquina shell, which is a small fish shell of the cockle variety, acts as a binder, and the result is that the beach becomes almost as hard as cement. The coquina shell is found in great hillocks in the neighborhood of Ormond and Daytona.

NO OPPOSITION TO MEETS.

The further fact that the beach, which is fully thirty miles long and fifty to one hundred yards wide, is Federal property, there can be no opposition to race meets, and the further important fact that from a safety point, it is the best course in the world, and makes the Daytona-Ormond beach a most desirable place to race over.

The course is bounded on one side by the Atlantic ocean, and being perfectly level, the tides gently leave the sands, and that accounts for its levelness. On the other side are the sand dunes, which form a natural amphitheater for miles, these dunes being dotted with palmetto and other tropicals, and make an ideal, safe place for spectators.

GOOD FACILITIES ASSURED.

The Florida East Coast Automobile Association writes that it has secured twenty miles of copper wire, and is erecting telegraph poles between the mile-posts on the beach which were put up last winter. This wire will be used for signal and timing purposes, as the races will be timed by electricity, as last year.

The races will start on January 27, four days after the closing of the New York show, which will give the show attendance two weeks between the New York and Chicago national shows.

NOTED DRIVERS COMING.

All noted American drivers will undoubtedly be there, and it is reported in New York that the Chevalier Rene de Knyff, the famous French driver of Paris, will be one of the competitors at the Florida meet, as a friend writes that he will be over here at that time. The Hon. C. S. Rolls, who made world's records during the Gordon Bennett races at Dublin, has been invited by the Automobile Magazine, and will come over. He is one of the noted world's record straightaway drivers. Mr. Rolls drives a 110-horse-power car, and he recently drove a kilometer in 26 2/3 seconds, which is nearly eighty-five miles an hour. Should Mr. Rolls come he will bring the record automobile with him.

George Cannon, the Harvard College steam vehicle constructor and driver, started last week that it is quite possible that he will go for some records in Florida, and if his new machine, which he is now building is not ready, he will drive this year's machine, which is good on a mile in 50 seconds on a straightaway course.

REFERRAL HAS BEEN MADE.

W. J. Morgan, 1 Madison street, New York, who is acting for the Automobile Association, has secured the promise of A. R. Pardington, chairman of the American Automobile Association, to act as referee of the tournament, and as the annual Florida winter tournament is strictly an amateur event, it is being supported by the leading gentlemen drivers.
