Such is the Title of Mr. Steck, Who
Was Elected President of the F.
E. C. A. A. Tuesday Night.

An important meeting of the Flor-
ida East Coast Automobile Associa-
tion was held at the Club House on
the beach Tuesday evening at 8 o'-
clock. The meeting was called
by order Vice President Hendricks,
and Assistant Secretary Harris, in
the absence of the regular officers
who are both in New York. It was
for the purpose of acting on the re-
signment of C. G. Burgoyne, as pres-
ident, who, in accordance with the
peremptory orders of his physicians,
had tendered the same to the Club.
The meeting was called late Tues-
day evening and many did not get
their notice in time to be present,
but there were about thirty at the
Club House when the meeting was
called to order.

After about two hours talk on the
matter the resignation of Mr. Bur-
goyne was finally accepted with ex-
treme regret, and a successor was
elected in the person of Edward M.
Steck, of Philadelphia, who has just
purchased a residence in Daytona,
and will arrive here some time next
week.

The Club was loth to part with
Mr. Burgoyne, as its president, but
as it seemed to be his earnest wish,
the same was respected. He has
done so much for the F. E. C. A. A.
and has done it so willingly that all
were extremely sorry to have him
retire from active work.

To Mr. Burgoyne, more than to
any other person does the Club owe
the proud position it now occupies;
to his indefatigable efforts are due
the erection of the magnificent Club
House, and to him to a large extent
is due the success of last year's races
and the bright outlook for the com-
ing meet. Hence, as we have said
before, the members of the Club
were more than sorry to have him
relinquish his position as their pres-
ident.

-of a valuable silver cup to be awarded
-in the name of the Club to the winner
-of the "fifty mile open to all race" at the
-coming meet, is only one more evi-
