**Volusia Recognized in Tallahassee.**

Volusia County has received recognition in the Senate and House at Tallahassee in a substantial manner. In the Senate, the Hon. Frank W. Sams, of New Smyrna, was appointed chairman of the committee on City and County Organization, chairman of the Fisheries Committee and a member of the Judiciary, Game, and Drainage and Reclamation of Lands.

In the House Hon. Chas. L. Smith, of Daytona, is chairman of the committee on Corporations, and a member of the committees on Finance and Taxation, City and County Organization and Militia and State Troops, while Mr. T. J. Sparkman, of Port Orange, is a member of the committees on Legislative Expenses, Public Roads and Highways, Agriculture, Fisheries and Indian Affairs.

**Charter Bill for Daytona.**

Representative Chas. L. Smith introduced House Bill, No. 90, in the House of Representatives at Tallahassee, Monday. This bill is an act "extending and enlarging the powers of the City of Daytona, a municipal corporation organized and existing in Volusia County, Florida, and providing for the exercise of these powers." The bill was referred to the committee on city and county organization.

On Wednesday the Bill was considered by the Committee and was reported favorably to the House.

A Bill to relieve the County Commissioners from the payment of the 60 per cent of road and bridge tax from and including the year 1903 and 1904, was likewise presented. This bill was reported adversely.
