Two Ferries Across the Halifax.

Two ferries will be operated next season from Daytona to Daytona Beach. The County Commissioners have granted permits for ten years to S. H. Gove and H. L. Armstrong for a ferry from Gille's dock to the south side of the middle bridge and to Leon Ellenwood from the foot of Volusia avenue to the foot of Seabreeze avenue, Daytona Beach.
