Yellow Fever at New Orleans.

The report of the breaking out of yellow fever at New Orleans is naturally causing much alarm at that place and points contiguous thereto. The local Boards of Health as well as the Federal authorities are doing everything possible to prevent the spread of the disease and state that they have the situation well in hand.

The western boundary of Florida is several hundred miles from New Orleans and there is practically no danger of the disease taking hold in Florida, but notwithstanding this the Florida State Board is taking no chances, and are working zealously to keep the scourge from gaining a foothold in the State.

Their efforts will be assisted very materially by the present unusually healthy condition of the entire State, but should the disease obtain a foothold in the State, Daytona, from its location would be practically immune. No rail or boat lines reach us from New Orleans or any other point likely to become infected, except Jacksonville, and our town would be practically isolated and cut off from the outside world in case of an epidemic.

The people of Daytona should keep their premises, bodies and streets clean and we will be in no danger.

Governor Broward has appointed John Y. Detwiler, of New Smyrna, Honorary Fish Commissioner, it is a thankless job and there is little or no pay in it, so it is well there is something "honorary" about it. But we are inclined to think that if there is any honor in the office, it is what Mr. Detwiler confers upon it, not it upon him.—Bartow Courier-Informant.
