FOURTH ANNUAL MEET, FLORIDA EAST COAST AUTO ASS'N

List of Events for the Greatest Automobile Speed Carnival Ever Held in the World.--Prize List is Exceptionally Large.--The Dewar and Minneapolis Club Cups the Finest Ever Seen.

With all indications pointing to the greatest motor speed carnival ever held in the world, the Florida East Coast Automobile Association has thoroughly deliberated over its program of events for the fourth annual meet the week of January 22nd, 1906. Several conferences have taken place between the representatives of the F. E. C. A. A., the Racing Board of the A. A. A., the National Association of Automobile Manufacturers, and the Automobile Club of America. The result is a list of events, which provides for all weights and powers and at the same time brings the various cars into the free-for-all competition at distances of one, five, ten, fifteen, thirty and one hundred miles.

Once the cry was for a mile a minute, but now the call is for a mile in two minutes, and a race of this character is to take place over the Florida sands, the winner being obliged to equal or exceed a speed of 120 miles an hour. Several flyers are in course of construction, and this startling flight of speed is the aim of the builders. Herewith is the list of events:

One Mile Middleweight Championship (Gasoline.)
One Mile Heavyweight Championship (Gasoline.)
One Mile Championship (Steam.)
One Mile World's Championship Free-for-All for Dewar Cup.
One Kilometer Record Trials for each weight and power class.
Two-Miles-a-Minute Record Free

for-All. (The winner must equal or exceed 120 miles an hour.)
Five Mile Middleweight Championship (Gasoline.)
Five Mile Championship (Steam.)
Five Mile Free-for-All Championship.
Ten Mile Middleweight Championship (All Powers.)
Ten Mile Heavyweight Championship (All Powers.)
Ten Mile Free-for-All Championship.
Ten Mile Handicap—Open to all Contestants Who Start in Previous Events.
Fifteen Mile Free-for-All Championship.
Fifteen Mile Price Handicap for American Touring Cars Fully equipped.
Thirty Mile Free-for-All Championship for American-Built Cars.
One hundred Mile Free-for-All Championship.

The prize list as usual will be exceptional in character and will contain many trophies of great value. The Minneapolis Cup, donated by the Minneapolis Automobile Club, of which Asa Paine, the new President of the F. E. C. A. A., is a member, and the Sir Thomas Dewar Trophy will be among the most magnificent. Motor racing enthusiasts, who may desire as last year to be represented in the Florida prize list, may communicate with the management. Such prizes will be allotted to the championship races scheduled above.

The attention of entrants is called

to clause 19 of the A. A. A. Racing Rules. "An automobile, motor car, or car within the meaning of these rules, is a four-wheeled track or road vehicle propelled by self-contained mechanical means, and provided with suitable brakes, a differential gear or its equivalent, and a reverse gear." Under the rules the weight classification is as follows: light weight, 551 pounds to 881 pounds; middleweight, 882 pounds to 1432 pounds; and heavyweight, 1433 to 2204 pounds.

At the May 4th, 1905 meeting of the A. A. A. Racing Board, it was decided "that cars be limited strictly to their own weight classes, since all cars are eligible in free-for-alls." This means the middle-weight cars cannot compete in the heavyweight class. No car over 2204 pounds weight is eligible to compete in any event.

In order to be eligible for the time trials, cars will be required to compete in the regular competition events in which they are entered. No car will be accepted for the touring car event unless fully described in the catalogue of the maker issued not later than thirty days before the closing of entries. All contestants will be subject to weight examination before and after competing.

The entrance fee for each event except the Dewar Cup Race is \$20. The Dewar race entrance fee is \$50. Entries will close January 8th, 1906.
