## THE MILLAGE IS FIXED.

Three Mill Tax Will Be Assessed to  
Build Hard Road Between Day-  
tona and DeLand.

The Board of County Commissioners met at DeLand, Monday evening. Present, F. E. Bond, chairman, R. D. Brooke, W. H. McBride, T. J. Murray and S. D. Jordan, clerk.

The following Road and Bridge Reports were submitted:

District No. 1—Repairs and work on Orlando road.

District No. 2—Trimming trees on Glenwood road.

District No. 3—General repairs.

District No. 5—General repairs.

The committee appointed to mark and view change in DeLand and Lake Helen road presented report which was read and filed, committee discharged and opening of said road on following lines ordered, after being advertised for thirty days, according to law: Commence at the Boulevard on New York Avenue in DeLand; from thence east on New York Avenue to the northeast corner of section 15 fifteen; thence south 58 degree and 30 minutes east 27 chains and 15 links on present road; thence south 72 degrees 30 minutes east 8 chains and 50 links on present road; thence north 87 degrees 30 minutes east on present road to Lake Winnemissett; thence along the Driveway around said lake to the street at the west end of the Stetson orange grove; thence south on said street to north line of section 21; thence east on said section line to the northeast corner of section 21; thence south on range line to Main Street in Lake Helen; thence east on Main Street to Lake Helen.

The bond of A. O. Botts, Superintendent of Public Instruction, for \$10,000, was approved.

The bond of J. R. Wetherell, Supervisor of Registration, for \$5,000, was approved.

The revolver bond of W. Gause was approved and the clerk was instructed to issue a license therefor.

A communication from Emily Pridoux was filed for reference.

The matter of assistance for Mr. Pendleton was refused on the ground that he is a citizen of Putnam county.

The communication from citizens of Kingston was ordered filed for information.

The claim of A. S. J. Marsh for damages sustained by his horse falling through the bridge at Aiken Ford was referred to attorneys for board.

On motion the clerk was granted a requisition for two warrant account books, for the County Treasurer, one tax title book, and to have 1904 tax book and map book No. 3 bound.

On motion the sheriff was instructed to purchase one dozen convict suits.

Criminal Court cost bills were examined and approved for the sum of \$105.91, and clerk instructed to issue warrants therefor.

The regular meeting day of the board was fixed for the first Tuesday of each month, except that the board shall meet on the first Monday where the law so directs; the clerk to notify the board of the meetings to be held on the first Monday.

The rifle bond of R. D. Martin was approved and the clerk was instructed to issue a license therefor.

The matter of the cost bill in the case of Henry Blackwelder was referred to attorneys of board.

The tax assessor was instructed to assess the Orange City Water Works for 1906 at \$3,000.

The tax books for the year 1906 were examined and compared and the tabulations as fixed by the tax assessor were approved and the following millages for the year 1906 were fixed:

General Revenue Fund, five mills.

School Fund, six mills.

Fine and Forfeiture Fund, one mill.

Paved, Macadamized and Hard Road Tax, three mills.

Sub-school districts numbers 2, 7,

8, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14, 18, 19, 23, 27, 30, 32, 38, 39, 31, 43, three mills each. The clerk was instructed to deliver a copy of this resolution to the tax assessor.

The final report and settlement of the tax collector for the year 1905 was duly examined and approved. The statement is published in this issue of the Gazette-News.

The treasurer presented his report for the month of June, together with his books and accounts, which were examined and on motion approved.
