The contract for lighting the city streets was presented and duly executed by Adam Schantz and the City Council and it was ordered filed. It provides for the payment of \$90 per arc light per year for a period of five years.

The final report of A. McI. Foster, the retiring city collector, was presented and referred to the finance committee.

W. G. Hobbs, the recently elected collector, filed his bond with C. M. Bingham and R. S. Maley as sureties. The bond was approved and Mr. Hobbs has already assumed the duties of office.

The matter of numbering houses in the city was left in the hands of a special committee, and it was empowered to proceed with the work, and have plats of the city made showing the designated numbers.

The street committee was empowered to handle the matter of filling Daytona avenue.
