Individual Fire Protection.

An ordinance will be presented at the next meeting of the City Council, looking to a better system of individual fire protection. This ordinance will require all residences and business places to be provided with six metal water buckets and a ladder of sufficient length to reach to the highest point of the building. These buckets must have the word "fire" painted upon them and be used for no other purpose and must be kept within easy access and in good repair. This ordinance would seem a wise precaution, as in many cases of fire, neither ladders nor buckets in sufficient number are available and valuable time is lost in securing them.

Will of H. C. Godman Filed.

Under the will of Henry C. Godman, filed recently at Columbus, Ohio, Mrs. Cora S. Godman, the widow, receives the residence and all chattels and stocks named in the will, aggregating about \$300,000 of par value; three bequests of \$10,000 each are made to charity; \$20,000 is given in individual bequests; and the balance of the estate is given to Foster Copeland, a nephew who is named as executor without bond, and relieved from filing any inventory. In probating the will Mr. Copeland officially estimated the value of the estate at \$450,000, of which \$50,000 is realty, in which is included the residence for which Mr. Godman paid \$75,000. Other relatives had been previously provided for under a trust agreement, and are not mentioned in the will.
