DAYTONA MAY HAVE A MODERN SCHOOL BUILDING.

Plans for a Structure to Cost
\$42,000 Have Been Prepared.

—It Is Needed.

If the sense of the meeting called by the local school trustees at the City Hall Friday evening of last week is to govern, Daytona will soon have a much-needed modern school building.

The meeting was attended by about fifty voters and they seemed to be in unison in favor of a new school house.

The plans presented by Robinson & Reidy, of Atlanta, the contractors who are putting up the Green Cove Springs school house, were accepted, and it was decided to begin the construction of the building when school closes, May, 1909. The old building will be torn down, and a building large enough to accommodate all grades and the high school will be put in its place.

It is to be a \$42,000 brick building, with tile roof, twelve study rooms, each with a seating capacity for fifty students; a superintendent's office, four recitation rooms, laboratories and an auditorium estimated to seat 750. The building is to be heated with steam, and the basement furnishes room for a gymnasium for boys and one for girls. The frontage of the building is 140 feet, and its greatest depth 80 feet. There will be cloak rooms, toilet rooms and all modern conveniences.

The trustees have \$8,000 on hand that can be used toward the cost of the new building, and it will be necessary to issue bonds for the balance of the cost. Some of the voters favored the construction of one wing of the building for immediate use, but it was thought wiser to begin the work next spring.

MOSQUITO BIRD RESERVATION HAS JUST BEEN POSTED.

All Persons Disturbing the Birds
Will Be Vigorously Prosecuted.—Severe Penalties.

Warden B. J. Pacetti has this week had large signs placed at different places on the Mosquito Inlet Bird Reservation, warning all persons not to trespass without obtaining permission from the warden; fire arms are not permitted on the reservation, and the birds must not be disturbed.

The Mosquito Inlet Reservation has been set aside as a breeding ground for birds under the jurisdiction of the Federal Government. It extends from Pelican Island on the north to the Sister Islands in the south and includes all marsh and overflowed lands from the peninsula to the mainland.

The law covering this reservation reads that it shall be unlawful for any person to hunt, trap, capture, wilfully disturb or kill any bird of any kind whatever or take the eggs of such birds. A penalty of six months in the Federal Prison or a fine of \$500 is provided for offenders.

Lightning Strikes Hotel.

Lightning struck J. R. Ellison's hotel at Ponce Park Saturday afternoon of last week badly tearing the cupola and burning a number of mattresses. The damage will amount to about \$100.

"Citizen" Seeks Light.

Editor Gazette-News:—
I note in the columns of the Halifax Journal two gentlemen of this city have taken exception to my article in regard to municipal ownership. They criticize it on the ground that the towns cited are mostly in the north and that no examples are taken from Florida. The fact of the matter is that few towns in Florida have had any experience in such matters and I still assert that the tendency among towns in the north where municipal ownership has been given a fair test, is to return to private ownership in waterworks.

They fail, however, whether intentionally or not, to treat of the real issue. It is not a question whether municipal waterworks do or do not pay in Jacksonville, Hoboken or Squedunk. The tax payers of those towns do not have to pay the bills if it does not pay in Daytona, and the tax payers who do have to pay the bills have a right to know what the situation will be here. All homes in Daytona have their own water plants and I do not believe that fifty people will take city water. How can a business be run without any revenue and yet the esteemed gentlemen who have attempted to answer my article fail to touch upon this point. If anyone can tell me how a plant can be made to pay without any revenue except that which comes from the city and which is not more than the interest on the bonds I will be very glad to be enlightened.

This is the important question and the one that should be considered by the persons affected by this ordinance. Very Truly,

HENRY H. THORP PASSED AWAY AT JACKSONVILLE LAST WEEK.

Was a Resident of Daytona Beach
Many Years.—Was a Former
Ohio Press Manufacturer

Henry H. Thorp, aged 71 years, died at Jacksonville, Friday morning of last week, after a lingering illness.

The deceased lived at Silver Beach, opposite Daytona, and had been in very poor health since the automobile accident when he backed off the South Bridge sustaining serious injuries. He had gone to Jacksonville a short time before his death for treatment, intending to go on north from there when he got better. The body was shipped to Geneva, Ohio, his old home, for interment.

Henry H. Thorp was for many years in business in Cleveland, Ohio, and was the pioneer in the manufacture of printing presses in that city. He also started the first type foundry in Cleveland. The firm was known as the H. H. Thorp Manufacturing Co., and there a few of the old time printers in Ohio who will not recall this firm. It was afterwards merged into the Cleveland Type Foundry and more recently went into the hands of the American Type Foundry.

When advancing years set its mark on Mr. Thorp he disposed of his interests in Cleveland and came to Florida settling at Silver Beach, where he and his family have since made their home. Up to the time of the automobile accident spoken of above Mr. Thorp had enjoyed fairly good health and bid fair to live many years.

Mr. Thorp was an estimable man and was respected by all. He leaves a wife and one daughter to mourn his demise.

RACE SUICIDE WITH HENS! EGGS ARE VERY SCARCE.

The Hens Were Killed Off Last
Winter and Their Fruit
Is Now Motherless.

From the present scarcity of hen fruit, an egg shampoo will be a rarity. Eggs are retailing at from 25 to 30 cents a dozen, but the grocers in Daytona are at their beam ends to know how to get enough. Eggs are scarce, but good eggs are scarcer yet. Many of them come into the stores ripe enough to drop if you shake the basket.

Grocers say the trouble with shipped eggs is that the farmers hold them for awhile, the railroads hold them for awhile and the consumer isn't to be blamed if he can't hold them.

Many of the hen owners around here sold all their hens last winter when there was a big demand for poultry, and without the hens to take care of them, the eggs get into bad habits. What hens are left scratching around seemed to be indisposed and trying race suicide.

Airships Next.

While the City Council was wrestling with the proposed revenue ordinance Monday evening someone stood on his funny-bone and suggested the following:

"An Ordinance regulating the status and employment of airships. "Section 1. For the purpose of this ordinance, the boundaries of the airship limit of the town shall be held to extend upwards in a vertical direction to a distance of twenty miles in the sky, and the area of the airship limit of the town shall be the same as the fire limit of the town."

Another section provides that the marshal shall have an aeroplane to chase offenders, while another provides for a license tax on all styles of air machines. Ninety days in jail or a fine of \$500, is the penalty for infractions.

The idea of the ordinance is said to have originated at Kissimmee.

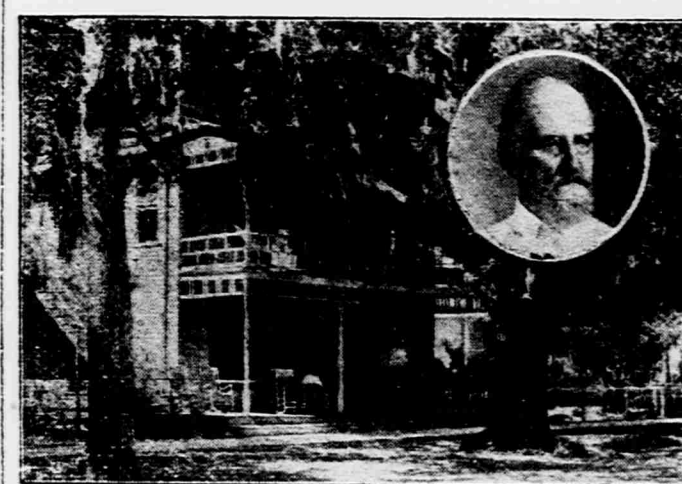
