

MRS. BOOTH TUCKER DEAD.

The daughter of Gen. William Booth, the head of the Salvation Army, was killed in a wreck on Oct. 28, by the Santa Fe train No. 2, being ditched at Dean Lake Mo., within a few miles of Bosworth Mo. Several others were injured some seriously. The death of Mrs. Tucker has spread gloom over the entire body of Salvationists—Wreck caused by soft track so we understand.

He Calls the National to a General Thanksgiving.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—The President has issued his annual Thanksgiving proclamation in the following terms:

"By the President of the United States of America—A Proclamation.

"The season is at hand when, according to the custom of our people, it falls upon the president to appoint a day of praise and thanksgiving to God. During the last year the Lord has dealt bountifully with us, giving us peace at home and abroad, and the chance for our citizens to work for their welfare unhindered by war, famine or plague.

It behooves us not only to rejoice greatly because of what has been given us, but to accept it with a solemn sense of responsibility, realizing that under heaven it rests with us ourselves to show that we are worthy to use aright what has thus been intrusted to our care.

In no other place and at no other time has the experiment of government of the people, by the people and for the people been tried on so vast a scale as here in our own country in the opening years of the twentieth century. Failure would not only be a dreadful thing for us, but a dreadful thing for all mankind, because it would mean loss of hope for all who believed in the power and the righteousness of liberty.

Therefore, in thanking God for the mercies extended to us in the past, we beseech Him that he may not withhold them in the future, and that our hearts may be aroused to war steadfastly for good and against all the forces of evil, public and private.

We pray for strength and light, so that in the coming years we may with cleanliness, fearlessness and wisdom do our allotted work on the earth in such manner as to show that we are not altogether unworthy of the blessings we have received.

Now, therefore, I, Theodore Roosevelt, president of the United States, do hereby designate as a day of general thanksgiving Thursday, the twenty-sixth day of November, and do recommend that throughout the land people cease from their wonted occupations

and in their several homes and places of worship render thanks unto Almighty God for his manifold mercies.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the City of Washington; this thirty-first day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and three, and of the Independence of the United States the one hundred and twenty-eight.
