From Texas Co. Again.

Texas country is situated in south central Missouri, in the second tier of counties from the Arkansas state line. As the Ozark mountains cross the county from northeast to southwest the country is rather rough and hilly in some parts of the county, but owing to the size of the county a variety of land is found within her borders, some being called prairie land. The soil is described as "a fertile brown loam, underlaid with a porous red subsoil," and is admirably adapted to fruit growing and mixed farming.

With an altitude of about 1,800 about the sea level, the air is pure and invigorating and malaria is unknown. The temperature rarely drops below zero in winter, or runs up high enough in summer to be a menace to health and comfort, while the nights are usually cool and pleasant.

We have very good outside stock range, in which the cattle, sheep, hogs, etc., run from April

1st to November 1st, and we usually have an abundance of good corn mast for the hogs, on which they fatten rapidly in the fall. The markets are good for all our products of the farm, and the necessities of life can be had as cheaply as in other sections, in fact, cheaper than in some sections of the North. We have good schools, as the county is not bonded but has \$20,000 of school fund money loaned out at 8 per cent interest, and taxes are low. There are 125 school districts in the county, and our school enumeration is 7,767, with an apportionment of \$1.29 to each child enumerated, of state school money.

The country is well watered, as springs are numerous, one being found on every 160 acres usually, and sometimes one farmer will have two and three good springs on one farm. There are some thirteen streams in the county, and fish are still quite plentiful in the larger ones, and small game is found along these streams also. Much of the land in the eastern part of the county is still heavily timbered and it is estimated that a car could be loaded with lumber every day for twelve years from the timber in ranges six and seven alone. Large tracts of this land is offered at very low figures, as much as 15,000 to 20,000 being offered for sale in one body, but now that the new railroad seems an assured fact in the near future land will go up with a bound.

Houston, the county seat, is centrally located, and is a prettily inland town of 800 population, and is noted as the home of the ginseng industry. It is 18 miles from the rail road, but an electric road is to be built from Cabool to Houston, which will open up one of the best sections of the Ozarks for development. Minerals in paying quantities have been found in different sections, but owing to lack of shipping facilities could not be profitably developed. Farms can be had from \$5 to \$10 per acre, ranging in size 40 to 160 acres, and we are pleased to see many farmers from other sections locating here, as we have room and a cordial welcome for all progressive farmers who care to come to our land of the Sunny Ozarks.

So many inquiries in regard to this section is a tax on one's time if all are answered, and I have answered almost a hundred inquiries within the past three months and take this method of giving general information in advance. Any further information not contained in this will be cheerfully given if the writer incloses an extra stamp to help pay for stationary.
