REVOLUTIONS AT WORK IN PETROGRAD

Petrograd, June 4.—Sailors from the Kronstadt garrison which recently declared its independence of the Central government, arrived at Petrograd and will immediately land men and make a demonstration. It was reported that the sailors attacked Gutuyeff, an island port of Petrograd, but this proved false. Petrograd waited for three demonstrations by the Kronstadt warships and as the time passed with no such incident, the sailors announced that it was regarded by some as a rule talk only to cause excitement in the city.

MEN WHO REGISTER MAY BE NOTIFIED IN TWO WEEKS, IF THEY ARE TO SERVE

Washington, June 4.—Gen. Crowder told the committee that the government doesn't contemplate any class exceptions but that all will be personally called. Farmers, operatives and other special workmen would not be exempted as such, nor as to territory, but all exemptions will be made individually. The men drafted will probably be in the training camps by September first. General Crowder also said that he favored beginning the selections within two weeks after the registration so the exemption work will be more expedited.

Jim Morris, Jess Musick and Marshall Thomasson, from thirty miles up Rocky Arroya, are in the city to make some necessary purchases and to attend to the duty of registration, if eligible. It is their intention to leave for home in the morning.

War Department May Draft Million and Half

WILL BE AVAILABLE OUT OF TEN MILLION EXPECTED TO REGISTER TOMORROW

Washington, June 4.—Plans of the war department are to draft nine hundred thousand to a million and a half of the ten million men who will register tomorrow for the new army was disclosed today by Provost Marshal General Crowder to the senate military affairs committee. "Exemptions," he said, "possibly will result in reducing the number to say one hundred and twenty-five thousand men for immediate service."
