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THE KAISER'S PEACE TERMS

GERMANY WILL OFFER PEACE, SAY RUSSIAN FACTIONS

No Annexations, No Indemnities Will Be the Basis of Proposal.

Petrograd, Dec. 20.—According to press reports, Russia has been informed by the central powers that they intend to make peace proposals to the allies. The Evening Post says that the Germans have officially informed the bolshevik government that the central powers are ready to consider an arrangement of peace on the basis of no annexations and no indemnities, but pointed out that self-definition of nations was impracticable.

KAISER'S TERMS MADE KNOWN BY NEUTRALS

Makes New Move in Attempt to Bring War to Close.

Washington, Dec. 20.—What purports to be the outline of the Kaiser's much advertised "Christmas peace terms" have been received through neutral diplomatics. The so-called terms include to leave the disposition of Alsace-Lorraine to Plebiscite inhabitants; England is to pay Germany for her lost African colonies, and the money is to be used for the rehabilitation of Belgium, Serbia, Rumania, Northern France, and Russian provinces bordering on the Baltic Sea, and Prussia is to become independent under German plan.

LLOYD-GEORGE TELLS COMMONS FACTS OF WAR

Germans Loose Heavily but English Hopes Not Realized.

London, Dec. 20.—Lloyd-George told the Commons that the margin of losses at sea were narrowing, and the sinkings by submarines was decreasing, while shipbuilding was increasing. Regarding the military situation he said that it was idle to pretend that hopes had been realized. This was a disappointment that he attributed to the Russian collapse. He stated that the Germans had had only one success, which was due to a surprise. The Germans, he said, had lost a hundred thousand prisoners, valuable positions and hundreds of guns.

COUNT LUXBURG TELEGRAMS TO BE EXPOSED

Documents That Caused Argentina - Germany Break to be Public.

Washington, Dec. 20.—Some two scores of telegrams, which passed between Count Von Luxburg, the German Argentine minister, and the German foreign office, will be made public today by the State Department by an agreement with the Argentine government, which also will publish them simultaneously at Buenos Aires. In these communications will be the exposure of Count Luxburg's telegram which said, "Sink without a trace." This was what caused a rupture of diplomatic relations between Argentina and Germany.

Ultimatum Sent to Rada Province

Ukraine is a part of the old kingdom of Poland.
