Washington, Nov. 4.—Armistice terms, under which Austro-Hungarian forces laid down their arms, were announced simultaneously in Washington with other allied capitals, and they accomplish the com-

Washington, Nov. 4.—The German armistice, under which Austro-Hungarian armies have laid down their arms, has been received in full by the state department today. The terms of this armistice will be made public some time today.

### EMPEROR CHARLES WILL RETIRE TO SWITZERLAND

Basel, Nov. 4.—Emperor Charles, of Austria-Hungary, is determined to abdicate and will retire to Switzerland, according to German newspapers. The emperor made the announcement during a conference Saturday with the new Austrian government and other influential leaders of the dual monarchy present.

With the American army on the Sedin front, Nov. 4.—American forces were pushing northward toward Sedin early last night, having reached Sommauthe, five miles north of Bazancy, and thirteen miles south of Sedan. The center of the advancing line is held by New York, Maryland, and West Virginia troops. To the right and left of these forces are the regulars from New York, New Jersey, District of Columbia, Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Missouri, Colorado and New Mexico troops.

### 5,000 PRISONERS AND HUNDREDS OF GUNS ARE TAKEN BY AMERICANS

Washington, Nov. 4.—With the Americans Northwest of Verdun, Nov. 4.—(From Gen. Pershing; official)—The American first army is continuing its advance northwest of Verdun and has extended the attack to the east bank of the Meuse river. All towns on the west bank of that river and south of Halles have been captured.

Washington, Nov. 4.—Pershing; Official.—The First American army captured dominating heights northwest of Verdun, bringing under their heavy artillery fire important railroads of Montmedy, Longuyon, and Conflans. The First army advanced 12 miles on the right on a mile front in 3 days. Over 5,000 prisoners and hundreds of guns being captured. Troops in action include regulars and the national army from Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Missouri, Colorado and New Mexico.

bilization of all Austrian forces, the surrender of half of their artillery and military equipment, the occupation of strategic places by allied forces, and the use of all Austrian railroads for operations against Germany, also the evacuation of all invaded territory.

The armistice terms also include the surrender of a portion of the Austrian fleet and the disarmament of the remaining ships under allied control, the surrender of all German submarines in Austrian waters, the repatriation of Austrian prisoners without reciprocity and the evacuation of all Austrian territory claimed by Italy.

London, Nov. 4.—The population of Hungary will take a public vote in one month from today to decide the question of whether they will continue to live under a monarchical form of government or change to a republic, according to the Exchange Telegraph dispatches received here from Copenhagen. The women have the same electoral rights as the men.

Copenhagen, Nov. 4.—Indications are that Russia will refuse to make further indemnity payments to Germany, according to the Frankfort Gazette.

Rome, Nov. 4.—(Via London.)—The entire Italian front continues to move forward, the war office announces today.

On the mountain front from Tonale to Garda, west of Trent, the Italian soldiers are progressing rapidly, advancing on Riva and other points west of Adige.

Amsterdam, Nov. 4.—Dr. Frederick Adler, who assassinated the Austrian premier, Sturgkh, on Oct. 21, 1916, has been released from prison, according to Vienna advices.

With the American Army Northwest of Verdun, Nov. 4.—More than 4,000 prisoners were captured by the Americans in this sector Sunday. The number of guns taken and also other booty falling into the hands of the Yanks is steadily growing today.
