The emperor made the announcement during a conference Saturday with the new Austrian government and other influential leaders of the dual monarchy present.

With the American army on the Sedin Front, Nov. 4 .- American forces were pushing northward toward Sedin early last night, having reached Sommauthe, five miles north of Buzancy, and thirteen miles south of Sedan. The center of the advancing line is held by New York, Maryland, and West Virginia troops. To the right and left of these forces are the regulars from New York, New Jersey, District of Columbia, Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Missouri, Colorado and New Mexico troops.

Washington, Nov. 4 .- With the Americans Northwest of Verdun, Nov. 4 .- (From Gen. Pershing; official). The American first army is continuing its advance northwest of Verdun and has extended the attack to the east bank of the Meuse river. All towns on the west bank of that river and south of Halles have been captured.
