WAR NOW OVER

All Fighting Ceased This Morning at 6 a. m.--A Complete Surrender

TERMS OF THE ARMISTICE

Washington, Nov. 11.—Terms of the armistice with Germany were read to congress by President Wilson at 1 o'clock this afternoon. Assembled in the house where 19 months ago the senators and representatives heard the president ask for a declaration of war, they heard him speak today words heralding the coming of peace.

The strictly military terms of the armistice were embraced in the 11 specifications which include the evacuation of all invaded territories, the withdrawal of German troops from the left bank of the Rhine, the surrender of all war supplies to the allies.

The terms also provide for the abandonment by Germany of the treaties of Bucharest and Brest Litovak.

The naval terms provide for the surrender of 160 submarines, 50 destroyers, 6 battle cruisers, 10 battleships, 88 light cruisers and other miscellaneous ships. All allied vessels in German hands are

to be surrendered. Germany is to notify all neutral nations they are free to trade at once on the seas with allied countries.

Among the financial terms are included restitution for damages done by German armies, the restitution of cash taken from the National Bank of Belgium and the return of gold taken from Russia and Rumania.

The military terms include the surrender of 5,000 guns, 2,500 light field artillery, 20,000 machine guns, 3,000 flame throwers, 2,000 airplanes. Also the surrender of 5,000 locomotives, 50,000 wagons, 10,000 motor lorries, railways of Alsace Lorraine for allied use and the stores of coal and iron are included. The immediate repatriation of all allied and American prisoners without reciprocal action by the allies is included in the armistice.

In connection with the evacuation of the left bank of the Rhine, it is provided the allies shall hold the river crossings at Coblenz, Cologne, and Mayence, and all bridgeheads in thirty kilometer radius from these places.

The right bank of the Rhine land, which is to be occupied by the allies, is to be a neutral zone. The bank held by the Germans is to be evacuated in 15 days. The armistice is only for 30 day's duration but the president spoke of the war as coming to an end.

The allied forces are to have access to the evacuated territory either through Danzinor or by the river Vistula. The unconditional capitulation of all German forces in East Africa within one month is provided.

Amsterdam, Nov. 11.—William Hohenzollern, the former German emperor and his eldest son, together with Field Marshal Hindenburg, it is learned from reliable sources, are in a railway train near Eystes station, awaiting the decision of the Dutch government as to whether they will be allowed to proceed on Dutch territory.

The blinds on the train are all pulled down.

Washington, Nov. 11.—By order of President Wilson, Provost Marshal General Crowder was directed to order the cancellation of all draft calls throughout the country, stopping the movement of over three hundred thousand men. The calls for the navy marine corps are unaffected. The entrainment of men for this branch of the service will continue as ordered. Secretary Baker later announced, that as far as practical, all men who have not yet completed their training will be immediately turned back to civilian life.

Washington, Nov. 11.—Announcement made verbally by official of state department in this form "Armistice has been signed. It was signed at five o'clock a. m. Paris time and hostilities cease at seven this morning Paris time." Terms of armistice announced not to be made public until later. Military men regard as certain they include immediate retirement of German military forces from France, Belgium and Alsace Lorraine. Disarming demobilization German armies. Occupation by allied and American forces of such strategic points in Germany as will make impossible renewal of hostilities. Delivery of part of German fleet and certain number of submarines. Distrainment of all other German warships. Occupation of principal German Naval Bases. Release of allied, American, soldiers, sailors, and civilians held prisoners.

Washington, Nov. 11.—President Wilson issued a formal proclamation at ten o'clock this morning announcing officially that the armistice with Germany had been signed.

The proclamation follows:

"My fellow countrymen: An armistice was signed this morning. Everything for which the American people have fought has been accomplished and it will be our fortunate duty to assist by example by sober friendly council, and by material aid in establishing just democracy throughout the world. WOODROW WILSON."
