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## Allies Receive Warm Welcome Into Lorraine

With the French Army in Lorraine, Nov. 18.—The French made their first entry into recovered Lorraine today. They were received by loud acclamations on the part of the population. The honor of leading the advance fell to the Moroccan division, including the famous foreign legion.

Soldiers of the legion wore their decorations, which were the highest accorded any unit of the French army during the war. The streets were filled before the troops came into sight and when the head of the column appeared, with General Dogan in the lead, it was received, with shouts of joy. The popula-

## GREATEST SURRENDER OF NAVAL FORCES IN HISTORY

Basel, Nov. 17.—The Hungarian government has ordered the mobilization of troops on the pretext that it is necessary for the maintenance of order, according to a Prague dispatch from the Czechoslovak press bureau which quoted advises from Skalitz. Four classes have been called. Among troops to be mobilized are the Slovaks.

With the American Forces of Occupation, Nov. 18.—One part of the American army of occupation moved forward today into Belgium while the remainder of the line swung steadily forward toward the German frontier.

Washington, Nov. 18.—It was reported to Gen. March that the third American army is advancing into Belgian territory being evacuated by the Germans. General Pershing announced that by nightfall yesterday the advance elements had reached the line of Ecouvlez, Sorbey, Muirs La Tour, or near the German border.

London, Nov. 18.—This week will see the greatest naval surrender the world ever witnessed. The great fleet of German battleships, battle cruisers, light cruisers, and destroyers will leave port Monday morning at 5 o'clock for an unknown destination. They will be met by the British fleet, and accompanied by American and French representatives and conducted to their destination.

tion rushed out with improvised paper flags; laughing, shouting and weeping.

The first automobiles to come into the town, which were loaded with French officers, were taken by storm and loaded to overflowing with boys and girls, cheering for France and singing the Marseillaise, while wheezy phonographs, which was the only music the town afforded, executed the national anthem from records that had escaped the eyes of Germans.

It is difficult to conceive that Chateau Salins could ever have been anything but French. Gen. Dogan's entry was preceded by the formal surrender of the town by four German officers who had remained to turn over the official administrations to the French.
