preceding year have been respectively 16.6 per cent, 34 per cent and 70 per cent. This year the increase having been practically double that of the year previous. Number of students in the sub-college, or preparatory department has decreased from 22 four years ago to 14 today. As rapidly as is practical this phase of the University's work will be eliminated. It has not been possible to do so up to this time. The enrollment of the lower classes this year is 21 juniors, 39 sophomores and 87 freshmen. Practically all of these intend to return to the University when the next semester opens August 22nd, while early figures in the Registrar's office indicate a freshman class of considerably more than 100. So that our percentage next year will be fully as large if not larger than during the year now closing.

You will not with interest I am sure that whereas but 12 of New Mexico's 26 counties were represented in the university enrollment four years ago, 22 counties or all but four have students here today. Next year I am informed every county in the state will be represented on the opening day. Possibly nothing speaks more forcefully of the university's broadening influence and service than this increased representation of the counties in the student roll.

"I am proud to point to the fact that of the present enrollment of 136 men and 86 women, 65 men or 48 per cent and 18 women or 20 per cent are wholly or in part self-supporting, paying their own way through college. It is a per centage I am told larger than can be shown in any other state university of self-supporting students.

FOURTEEN GRADUATES RECEIVE DEGREES

Albuquerque, N. M., May 10.—Fourteen graduates from the various college departments received Bachelor Degrees and four certificates from the Department of Education at the annual commencement exercise of the University of New Mexico, here this morning.

The commencement address was delivered by Hon. W. C. Reid, whose subject was "University in its Relation to the State." Captain Reid's address dwelt in a thoroughly practical way with the uses of the higher educational institution to the state. It was one of the most practical graduation addresses that has been heard in New Mexico. President David Ross Boyd gave an interesting review of the growth of the university during the four years of his presidency, and at the same time presented a modest and convincing outline of indications for immediate future developments. President Boyd said in part:

"These exercises close the fourth year of the University of New Mexico under the present administration and a brief report is due the people as to progress made. If number of students is an index of growth I believe satisfaction will be found in statistics prepared by the registrar which I wish to present.

"Total enrollment of the University four years ago was 99, of whom 78 were of full college rank. Today's total enrollment is 222, of whom 208 are of full college rank, or an increase in college students of 167 in four years. From year to year, for the four years period increases over the
