

Republican County Convention.

The Republican County Convention met yesterday at the Court House at 3 o'clock, and was attended by full and enthusiastic delegations from each precinct.

The meeting was called to order by the president of the executive committee.

Mr. Ramon Ulibarri was made president of the meeting and Messrs. Francisco Lopez and Trinidad Romero vice-presidents.

J. F. Baca and Placido Sandoval were elected secretaries.

Messrs. Ignacio Esquivel, Eugenio Romero and Nepomoceno Segura were appointed a committee on credentials.

The following persons were appointed special police to keep order during the meeting:

Francisco Baca, Epifanio Baca, Jose Ramirez, Pablo Ulibarri, Jose L. Rivera, Conuto Maes, Francisco Sena F. Maros, Domingo Montoya and Jose Segura.

After examination of the credentials the committee reported them correct. After the report, the permanent organization was proceeded with.

Hon. T. Romero was made the permanent president, and Francisco Lopez and Ramon Ulibarri vice-presidents.

On motion of J. C. Armijo, three members from each precinct were chosen to present a ticket to the convention.

After recess, to give the committee time for consultation, the convention reassembled and the committee reported the following candidates for the various offices:

Everything passed off harmoniously and much enthusiasm for the ticket was exhibited by the participants.

Hurrahs, cheers and firing of pistols amid the music of the band announced the close of the convention at a late hour last night.
