Hanlan Wins the Boat Race
Against Trickett, the Australian.

The Chillians and Peruvians
Still Making things Lively in South America.

The New York Clergymen Look
With Disfavor on the Passion Play.

Seven Hundred Thousand
Heathens to be Converted in a Peculiar way.

South American Matters.
Panama, November 8.—A Lima correspondent of the Star and Herald says Commander Lynch continues his raid through the defences of northern towns and valleys of Peru. The damage done is immense. The people are panic stricken and all able to do so have gone to the towns in the Cordilleras and on the other slope. It is hardly possible that the Chillians will care to penetrate these places. Blackmail has been extensively used by Commander Lynch and all who have been requisitioned and not paid up have had their property destroyed. The raiders arrived in the vicinity of Moscon, a plantation in the Chicama valley owned by Señor Oriologazo. Commander Lynch demanded from him \$150,000, saying that he would re-embark his troops. The Peruvian prefect has communicated with Dictator Perato for instructions and enclosed a dispatch from the American minister, W. H. Kauffman who said that it was important to all that the commander of the Peruvians should come prepared to pay the war contribution which with perfect right has been imposed by the Chillians, of town and valley of Trujillo, Pieralto answered, we pay a ransom with lead alone and all you have to do is to defend yourself at hazards and the damage involved was absolutely necessary, but the same should not occur there as in the rest of the North and that they should pay something for invading. A dispatch of Consul Kouffman will be sent to the American legation in order it and his Government may appreciate as it deserves the term and the perfect right as applied to the Chillian depredations, which have no equal in usages in other nations. This dispatch from the dictator put an end to all attempts at arrangement. A skirmish recently took place near Maquiza between 400 Peruvians and 300 Chillians which resulted in the defeat of the latter. They have almost a thousand men on San Lorenzo busily engaged in constructing batteries, they have cattle on the island. During two days they were trans-shipping plunder to a transport which left for the south apparently with fair cargo some satisfaction to Peruvians that whilst their coast is being plundered the Arancarian Indians are reaping a similar harvest in the south of Chili by driving off herds, destroying villages and killing the inhabitants in large numbers. The Peruvians devoutly wish that the tidal wave may have again swept into the Arco bay and destroyed the Chiian transport at anchor there. A large torpedo was set off in Callao bay in hopes of destroying some of the Chillians. The vessel held three tons of powder. When it exploded it threw up an immense volume of water and took the whole country. The Chillians fleet was made aware of the danger and gave the Torpedo a wide berth.

The Sculling Race.
London, November 15.—The sculling match between Edward, Hanlan and Edward Trickett of Sidney, over the Thames champion course from Putney to Martlock for the championship of the world, a challenge cup and four hundred £ sterling, came off today and was won by Hanlan in a handsome style. The race was a mere procession from the start to the finish. Hanlan rowed splendidly. He stopped several times, allowing Trickett to come up. A large crowd of people witnessed the affair. This forenoon Trickett was the favorite in the betting five to four being

aken on him, and taken to the extent of £1,000; but before the start, Hanlan had taken the first place in betting. Seven to four on him was offered freely and some wagers were made two to one. The weather was dull and chilly. The start took place at 12:23, at which time the tide was nearly full and weather slack and smooth. Throughout Hanlan had the sunny side of the river. A very even start was effected, Hanlan striking water at the rate of thirty-five strokes to the minute and Trickett at the rate of forty-one. Hanlan rowed easily and in perfect style showing his superiority from the first stroke.

California Fruits.
New York, Nov. 15.—Monday's Times in its review of winter says: "Fruit presents something of a winter appearance. Summer fruits, berries, peaches, pears and plums, have all given away to apples, oranges and melons. The almost total failure of the California pear crop has been severely felt, since for the past several years California pears have been making at this time at the year the most attractive portion of the market exhibit, but, although the Garden State has failed to contribute her usual quantity of pears, she is far better than ever before with grapes. This week some of the very finest of California grapes ever sent east will arrive. These grapes are tender and of a delicate flavor, and generally being very fine. Perhaps the most attractive of all the varieties which come from that state is the Black Marraeco. As its name indicates it is of a very dark color and generally of a large size.

The Passion Play.
New York, November 15.—The Tribune of Monday says that the scheme to represent the Passion play at Booth's is looked on with great disfavor by the clergymen of New York. The Tribune reporters have talked about the matter with Rev. H. C. Potter, John Hall, Thos. Armitage, J. P. Newman, H. W. Bellows, Edward McGlynn and Robert Collyer, and all are strongly opposed to the play and give their reasons for their opposition in an impressive and forcible manner. The subject in the Episcopal, Presbyterian, Baptist, Methodist, Unitarian and Catholic churches of this city is indicted by these interviewers and it seems plain that if the play is carried out it will be in the face of strong public sentiment.

Ship Canal.
Chicago, Nov. 15.—The Times says the projected ship canal from Chicago to the Mississippi river will not be allowed to slumber in the presence of such prosperity as now envelops the land. Congressman Farwell advocates the widening of the Illinois and Michigan canal to La Salle and the improvement of the Illinois River, but the Secretary of the Board, Charles Randall, favors a new cut from La Salle to the most direct point on the Father of Waters. The estimated cost of the scheme is fifteen million to twenty-eight million. Wall street production of a higher rate of interest is due to the absorption of \$125,000,000 or more in the construction of railroads on the Pacific coast.

Foreign Troubles.
London, November 15.—A reinforcement of one hundred men have been sent to Baycote's house. Preparation is being made for military occupation at Headport four miles farther on in consequence of the threatening aspect of affairs there. There was no land meeting at Gates Baycote's house Sunday, but a great meeting was held fourteen miles off; there was over five hundred persons present.

More Letter.
New York, November 15.—The Tribune says that the southern democratic press showed more judgment in the treating of the forged Chinese letter than the northern journals of the same party. So far as known but one southern paper published Barnum's fac simile. Others regarded it with silent loathing or as a matter of little importance.

To Be Converted.
St. Petersburg, Nov. 15.—The General of Kosa is to be superceded and the troops will shortly forcible convert 700,000 Tartars to the orthodox religion.

Arrivals.
Madrid, Nov. 15.—The arrival of French monks at Alcañete and Barcelona caused hostile popular demonstrations and they were compelled to re-embark for the latter place.

Baptist Conference.
New York Nov. 15.—The Baptist Pastors' Conference of this city unanimously and without debate adopted the following in view of the projected playing of "Passion" by one of the theaters of this city: "Resolved that as a conference we protest against sacrilegious use of the most sacred thing of our religion."

Statement.
New York, Nov. 12.—The comparative statement of exports from New York to foreign ports for ten months from January first, shows an increase exclusive of specie, of \$53,770,814 over 1878 and with specie included the excess is 47,454,303 and 48,213,243 dollars respectively.

Colorado Cuttings.
The corner stone of the Colorado Springs M. E. Church was laid on the 11th.

The freighters union between Cañon and Silver Cliff demand one dollar a hundred for freight, which the Prospect says amounts to forty dollars a load, and threatens the lives of any who take freight for a less amount.

The Silver Cliff waterworks are to be completed by Christmas.

The Rio Grande people are building section houses and depots at Texas Creek.

Presbyterian churches were organized this past summer at Gunnison City, Irwin, Ruby Camp and South Arkansas.

The Glemser hotel building at Denver is the prospective place for the meeting of the state legislature.

By degress the business advantages of Las Vegas are becoming known to the people of other states. Already we hear of many who are putting their business affairs in such a condition that, if they find this place all that it has been represented, they can engage in business here. Mr. Schaefer, of the firm of Schaefer & Finn, Sedgwick City, Kansas, is expected here to-day to look up a location.
