Yesterday was a perfect day. If some of the tourists who visited here in the "winter of our discontent" could only experience a day like yesterday, they would consider that the term, tropical, as applied to our climate, is no sarcasm.

Hopper Bros. have been doing a fine business during the past month as is shown by the amount of freight paid out. During the month of January this firm has paid out as freight on goods, received at, and shipped from, Las Vegas the large sum of \$2,652.15.

Hopper Bros., McKay, Judge Steel, A. C. Sloan, Payne Bartlet, are soon to commence the erection of five new business houses on Railroad avenue. The buildings will be composed of stone with cut stone fronts. These buildings will all likely be two stories high. This will be a fine block and will add much to the appearance of that portion of the town known as the burnt district.

The eastern train was delayed fifteen hours by a washout near Lower Animas Forks. The bed of Muddy Creek follows along the bankment, where it makes a long curve, and the stream becoming swollen by melting snow on the range broke through the earthwork. It will take several days to repair the damage, but in the meantime some temporary structure will be put in to afford the passage of trains, else passengers and baggage will be transferred.

Senate.

Washington, Feb. 3.—Logan's joint resolution to extend the franking privilege to communications received by Congressmen from the executive department on business of constituents was reported back without recommendation, the committee being equally divided.

Telegraph Companies Consolidated.

New York, Feb. 3.—To-day the Western Union, American Union and the Atlantic & Pacific telegraph companies were consolidated and at a late hour this afternoon the Western Union took possession of the offices of the other two companies.

The following announcement has just been issued at the office of the Western Union Telegraph Company:

New York, Feb. 3rd, 1881.—The Western Union telegraph company, having this day completed the purchase and taken possession of the lines, properties, rights, and privileges of the American Union and the Atlantic & Pacific Telegraph Companies, David H. Bates has been duly appointed agent for this company and general manager of the lines, officers and operations of the properties turned over by the American Union Telegraph Company, and Albert Chandler, has been appointed agent for this company and general manager of the properties and rights turned over by the Atlantic & Pacific Telegraph Company, until further notice. All officers and employees of either of the aforesaid companies will be retained in the service of this company till further notice, and all business done and revenues occurring in the operation of the said lines will be reported and turned over to this company. Colorado Legislature.

Denver, Feb. 3.—Several bills passed and among them House bill No. 25, on primary election.

The House then went into a committee of the whole.

The Industrial School Bill was taken up and amended.

House bill No. 72, regarding the military was recommended back.

House bill No. 170, to provide evidence concerning ores received by parties engaged in purchasing, shipping, milling, etc., of ores was reported back to pass.

House bill No. 161, to fix the ratio for the apportionment of senators, caused a long and sharp debate by the republicans, participated in by Hudson, Baker and others in favor of Lee, Johnson, Lyon, Doe, Carpenter and others against.

Doe moved to recommitt the bill on the apportionment of the last one.

Johnson moved to make it a special order for to-morrow at 7:30 p. m. which was adopted.

The House resumed, and after receiving several committees, adjourned till morning.

The only bill considered in the senate to-night was House bill No. 18, the railroad bill.

Stobbering Over Grant.

Springfield, Ill., Feb. 3.—The House of Representatives this morning adopted the following resolution by a strict party vote and without debate:

WHEREAS, The people of the State of Illinois feel a just pride in the illustrious career of the most distinguished citizen of this State, U. S. Grant, and regard with pleasure the honor and admiration which have been bestowed upon him throughout the civilized world, and

WHEREAS, His distinguished military services have conspicuously tended to add to the lustre and re-

nown of this nation and will illuminate the pages of history, and

WHEREAS, Services so marked and distinguished have been by all nations and in all ages accorded recognition by national authority, therefore be it

Resolved, By the House of Representatives, the senate concurring therein, in behalf of the people of Illinois that our Senators and Congressmen be requested to use all honorable means to secure the passage of such a law.

Resolved, That the Secretary of State be, and he is hereby instructed to forward copies of this resolution to our Senators and Representatives in Congress.

California's Rainfall.

San Francisco, February 3.—Rain continues throughout the northern and central portions of the state, extending from the Sierras to the ocean. The rainfall increases as the storm continues. Dispatches from mountain counties state that the thermometer is between 55 and 60°. The rain is heavy in Shasta. To-day the rain fell at the rate of nearly one inch an hour. Several cloud bursts occurred in that county doing considerable damage. The situation at Sacramento is critical, and to-morrow may see that place under water.

A Suitable Vessel.

Washington, Feb. 3.—The Secretary of the Navy to-day received advices from New Bedford, Massachusetts, containing assurances that in the event of a decision in favor of purchasing a whaling steamer to be dispatched by the United States Government in search of the Arctic exploring steamer Jeannette, that a suitable whaler is now at San Francisco and can be had but the prices are not suitable.

Theater Burned.

Chicago, Feb. 3.—This morning Independence Hall lodging house and quasi theatre burned. The lodgers had a narrow escape by means of ladders and a rope knotted. The bedding and adjoining roofs rendered them valuable service and saved many lives. The loss on the building and contents will probably be \$35,000. Insurance \$25,000.

The Poncas.

Washington, Feb. 3.—There is a statement that the Boston Philanthropist in the Ponca case has been unwilling to continue the debate on the old Ponca reservation. Yet he will bestow as much investigation in this case as possible. The Poncas may yet find that there is something not altogether to their credit.

Murderer Caught.

St. Louis, Feb. 3.—It has just transpired that a man named Albert Orth who was arrested here Sunday night, on a charge of murdering Jas. Burns, a miner, near Hugo, Colorado, a short time ago and has been taken back in charge of a man named Shipley who was sent out by miners to hunt him.

Ineffectual Lynching.

Fort Concho, Tex., Feb. 3.—The soldier comrades of the murdered Watkins made an ineffectual attempt to capture and lynch his murderer, McCarthy, being away from the place where he was supposed to be alone saved him.

Cold, Colder, Coldest.

New York, Feb. 3.—To-day was the coldest day ever known by the oldest inhabitants. The streets are very slippery and are blockaded from falling horses. There are numerous cases of frost bites. The ferry is almost blockaded.

Toronto reports that it is colder than it was in January.

The Provision Market.

New York, Feb. 3.—There is a marked increase since the first of the year in the foreign provision trade. Six hundred thousands pounds more have been shipped than in January 1880 from New York alone.

The Reason.

New York, February 3.—The sudden ratification of the telegraph consolidation was evidently for the purpose of forestalling any action by the State Senate on the bill passed by the Assembly yesterday.

Abducted.

Berlin, Feb. 3.—William, son of Hereditary Prince Leopold of Hohenzollern, recently chosen heir to the Roumanian throne, was forcibly abducted by three men and taken across the Rhine. He subsequently escaped.

Hanged.

Williamsport, Pa., Feb. 3.—George Smith and Catharine Miller were executed this forenoon. They died without a struggle. They were twice tried and each time were found guilty of murder.

Killed a Constable.

St. Louis, Feb. 3.—At Roanoke on Saturday, during a row at a negro dance, a man going by the name of George Erhart, shot and killed a deputy constable.

Telegraph Bill Referred.

Albany, N. Y., Feb. 3.—The telegraph bill has been referred to the committee on Miscellaneous Corporations which is probably its death blow.

Failed.

Bath, N. Y., Feb. 3.—Lornis & Masters, carriage makers, failed for the amount of \$140,000; their assets amount to \$85,000.

Acquitted.

Denver, Feb. 3.—Stattor was to-day acquitted of the murder of Daniel Farr which occurred last spring.
