NEWS BY TELEGRAPH

Lieutenant Maney Follows a Party of Indians to the Borders of Old Mexico.

The Russian-Chinese Treaty Almost Ready for Signatures—Other Foreign News.

A Mulatto Makes Himself Notorious by Stealing Small Boys—Congressional News.

A Startling Declaration Concerning Railroads and the National Debt.

Senate.

Washington, Feb. 22.—Mr. Bayard, from the committee on finance, reported with a substitute, the Senate bill to repeal all laws that impose taxes on capital and deposits of banks and bankers and on bank checks. The substitute provides simply for the repeal of the tax on bank deposits.

Wallace, from the same committee, reported adversely the bill to authorize the issue and provide for the redemption of fractional notes. The bill was indefinitely postponed.

House.

Washington, Feb. 22.—The conference report on the pending appropriation bill was agreed to.

Bicknell reported back the bill in relation to the Venezuelan award to the committee of the whole.

Rice reported back the joint resolution providing a joint committee to investigate the alleged fraudulent statistics used before the Halifax fisheries commission, to the committee of the whole.

Richmond, Feb. 22.—Walker Amos confessed that he had enticed a small boy named Williams from his home 303 Brigat street, Indianapolis, and started on foot with him to this place and that they walked 16 miles the first day. When the boy's got tired Amos took a rape and made a cat-nine-tails and lashed the boy to make him walk. He whipped the boy until he nearly fainted. They walked on to Irish Mound, begging as they went, the boy being forbidden, under pain of death, to make any complaint. At this place he took another boy named Radeliff and started towards Pittsburg, compelling the boys to walk over frozen ground and beating them unmercifully whenever they complained. They had reached Troy, O., when they were overtaken by parties from here and brought back. Amos says that he intended to take them to Harrisburg, Pa., to his mother and have her raise them. Amos is a light colored mulatto, very tall and slight. He says he had been a porter in a respectable saloon in Chicago.

The Russian-Chinese Treaty. St. Petersburg, Feb. 22.—The Golos announces that the treaty between Russia and China is expected to be ready for the signatures in about a week, after which Marquis Tzang, the Chinese ambassador, will go to Paris to settle some pending questions between France and China, but his departure from here cannot be considered as final, until the formal ratification of the treaty has been received from Peking, and the Russian ratification has been forwarded thither.

Washington Notes.

Washington, Feb. 22.—The military committee of inaugural ceremonies not deeming the programme adopted by the chief marshal, Sherman, as suitable, adopted a programme of its own which will be submitted to the executive committee. The general plan of the parade, according to this programme, is that all organizations intending to participate therein, civil as well as military, shall act as an escort.

The President has gone to Alexandria, Virginia, to a carnival.

Sufficient to Pay the National Debt. New York, Feb. 22.—Judge Black said at an anti-monopoly meeting last night that the railroads between here and Chicago have made sufficient in one year to pay off the National debt. He said that freights were fifteen per cent higher than they should be and that men were in Sing Sing for the same thing the railroad companies were doing.

After the Indians. Fort Cummings, Feb. 22.—Lieut. Maney with Company K, 9th cavalry and thirty Indian scouts just returned from following a band of Apaches to Mexico. He came upon their camp in a cañon in the Candelera Mountains on the night of the 12th, but before he could attack them they broke and scattered into the mountains and could not be overtaken. The camp and thirty head of horses were captured. Lieut. Maney pursued the Indians about a hundred and fifty miles over a very rough country and for eight days could get only alkali water and for two days not any at all.

Stabbed and Robbed. Summerset, Ky., Feb. 22.—Harvey Russell started on Saturday from a spelling match to attend a speaking at some distance, and not returning search was made and he was found by the roadside stabbed in twenty-two places and his skull fractured. A \$150 dollar watch and other articles were missing. Five men were arrested who were with him shortly after he left the spelling match—only circumstantial evidence points to them as guilty.

Public Interest. New York, Feb. 22.—The Times says that the number and character of the audience at the anti monopoly meeting last night sufficiently demonstrated the growth of public interest in a set of questions which are foremost among politics of the day. The league fully recognizes the necessity for an indefinite reduplication of its aim and for the thorough agitation of its principles in every part of the Union.

Irish Affairs. London, Feb. 22.—Parnell and other Irish members will address their constituents next Sunday. The Daily News says that if the improvement in the state of Ireland continues it is probable that the government will not proceed with the arms bill.

The Objectionable Parts. London, Feb. 22.—In the house of commons the Attorney General stated that the objectionable parts of Parnell's speech at Clara would receive his careful attention. The announcement was received with cheers.

Whirling Among the Drifts. How a Big Mogul on the Missouri Pacific Tore Through a Snow Bank.

The other night, when trains were stuck in the snow between here and Kansas City, it was with the utmost difficulty that they were started again. Mr. Kipp was with one of the snow-bound trains and he gives some interesting details as to the methods employed to get the trains started. After a number of workmen had shoveled a large space in front of one of the stolid locomotives it was run for a short distance and stuck again. In a few hours there were two "dead" locomotives on the track, the fuel and water having been exhausted. At this moment train No. 4, which is drawn by one of the big Moguls, or consolidated engines, came along. The two dead locomotives were pulled out of the way and the track thus left clear. There was a pretty heavy drift on the track head for a distance of about one hundred and fifty yards, but Mr. Thought the Mogul could clear it without damage to the engine. He ordered the engineer to pull away back from the drift and go at it with a full head of steam on. The engine took a good ready, the throttle valve was opened, and she came thundering down the track at the rate of thirty-five miles an hour, while Kipp stood near the drift whirling his lantern as a signal to let her rip. She did rip, and he says he never saw a grander or more exciting thing in his life than that huge locomotive, with a perfect cloud of big sparks pouring high up into the air from the smoke-stack, great sheets of snow flying from each side of the locomotive, like the white capped waves from the prow of a swiftly moving steam cutter, and the air, for thirty feet around the engine, filled with a cloud of snow that made it look like a snow slide in motion. The big locomotive swept everything before it, but its speed was slackened by the resistance of the drift to about fifteen miles an hour. She came through all right and stopped, panting puffing and trembling, like a race horse as he reaches the goal.—Sedalia Democrat.
