TELEGRAPHIC.

The War in the East—Turkey Will Soon Have an Army in the Field.

The Revenue Cutter That Started For the North Has Been Heard From.

The Amnesty Bill Has Been Adopted by the Chamber of Deputies.

Constantinople, July 8.—By order of the minister of war, Revif Pasha, governor of Adriaoupe, has commenced to mobilize a second army corps. The task is difficult, as arms and horses are wanting; but Revif Pasha hopes by the 20th inst. to have 21,600 effective men, three companies of cavalry and thirty three guns in readiness for the field. The offices for enrollment for volunteers were opened throughout Vilament on the 28th of June, and the returns for the first two days are reported to be 14,000 enrolled. Troops have been constantly arriving at Adriaoupe during the past week. The *Bokit* announced that the decision of conference was communicated to the Turkish minister at Berlin, who has been instructed to reply that the boundary adopted cannot be accepted.

Silver Cliff, July 8.—Yesterday a very rich strike of horn silver was made at Grass Root on the Heeta claim and the people are wild with excitement over it. The ore runs as high as 21,000 ounces to the ton, and is beyond a doubt one of the richest strikes yet made in this camp. The claim is just a few hundred yards east of the famous "Racin Bay" and just outside of the city limits. The Caston Bro., who owns this property have been offered \$100,000 for it already.

San Francisco, July 8.—A Port Townsend dispatch says that the schooner *Isabelle*, just from the north brings the following written report dated Ounaska, June 3d. Arrived United States revenue cutter Corwin twelve days from Frisco; all well. Signed C. S. Hopper, Capt. Corwin. It will be remembered, was dispatched with supplies for the ice bound Arctic whalers.

St. Petersburg, July 8.—The *Invalide Russe* asserts that the telegraphic advices from Turkestan contains nothing justifying the reports by way of India respecting the alleged defeats of Russians by the Chinese. Ft. Tash Kurganner, near Ft. Norer, was recently sacked by Muslemes; hence the probable origination of the report of the capture at Ft. Norer by the Chinese.

Minneapolis, Minn., July 8.—The convention that renominated Washburne yesterday was a large one, and the nomination was made without a dissenting voice, the general expression being in favor of a rebuke of the attempt of Donnelly to overthrow the will of the people as expressed at the polls two years ago.

Paris, July 8.—The chamber of deputies have adopted the final report of the committee on amnesty, it being Senator La Biches alternative bill in its original form; but limiting the period assigned for granting of pardons by the government to the interval between the present date and the 14th inst.

Cincinnati, July 8.—Dream won the 2:25 race after five heats. Best time, 2:23. Billy Scott won the 2:23 pacing race in 2:27; 2:29; 2:28.

Vicksburg, Miss., July 8.—The Republican convention nominated John R. Lynch, colored, for Congress from the sixth Mississippi district. He was Gen. James R. Chalmers constituent.

New York, July 8.—Says the *Herold's* Washington special to-morrow it is understood here among personal friends of Hancock that he will, prior to the publication of his letter of acceptance, tender his resignation to the President as Major General of the United States army.

Our readers will have to excuse the shortness of our report this morning, as the operator has not had a wire all day. What report we have are deferred dispatches from last night.

Mounted Infantry Captains.

A pamphlet just published in Paris contains some interesting remarks on the question of mounted infantry Captains, which as is well known, has during the last few years been much discussed in France. In support of the proposal to make all Captains mounted officers it is urged that now that a company numbers 250 men, as it does in the French and in nearly every Continental army, and now that men fight in extended order it is no longer possible for an officer on foot efficiently to supervise and direct the movements of his company. On the line of march a company in column of route will extend along a considerable length of road, so that unless its captain is mounted he will not be able to be, as he should be, at one moment at its head, at the next at its tail, enforcing order everywhere, while, in the same way, when a company placing over 200 bayonets in the field is extended in fighting formation it will cover so great a length of front that it will be impossible for an officer on foot to control the action of every part of it. On the other hand, it is argued by those who object to making infantry captains mounted officers that the latter would be more exposed to the enemy's musketry fire. In the pamphlet just published, however, the author shows that in practice this is not found to be the case. In the German army infantry captains are, it is well known, mounted. During the late Franco-German war 1,521 German infantry officers were killed, and, as the proportion of captains to other officers in the German army is as 1 to 5, a fifth of the above number, or 304 of the officers killed, should have been captains. As a matter of fact, however, only 219 captains were killed. In the same way the Germans lost 217 infantry officers at Forbach, but only 34 were captains; while of 205 French officers killed 54 were captains.

Mining Notes.

If reports are true the mines in the Hell Cañon district are improving in richness with additional stroke of the pick, and a rush to that locality is the next thing in order. The only drawback to the boom is the small amount of work now being done, and the apparent disposition of the claim owners to allow somebody else to make the developments. Business men of Albuquerque who have locations in the district cannot invest a few dollars more profitably than by sinking some left shafts in Hell Cañon.

The Noiad Queen mine in the Georgetown district was sold to a New York company recently for \$200,000. The former owners, had prior to the sale, taken out of the mines eleven silver bricks which are valued at \$600,000. And still there are those who claim that New Mexico cannot compete with Colorado in the production of precious metals.

Some very rich discoveries have been recently made in the Cooney district in the Mogollon Mountains. One location called the Silver Bar, is said to contain the largest body of ore ever seen, and its owners have refused an offer of \$250,000 for it.—*Golden Gate.*

The Republican majority in Pennsylvania at the last presidential election was 17,986, which in a total vote of 758,977 was rather small. What with Gen. Hancock's great popularity in his own state on one hand and Republican indifference and dissension on the other, it would seem highly probable that the electoral vote of Pennsylvania will be cast for the Democratic candidates.

A man in Chicago makes a living as a searcher for lost things. He goes to places of public resort such as parks where free concerts have been given, before daylight every morning, looking for accidentally dropped articles.

The Japanese students of Harvard are very popular both in college and in Boston society. Their facility in assimilating themselves to the habits and customs of a new country is much commented on.
