## TELEGRAPHIC.

### Fraudulent Census Returns in the Southern States.

One County in South Carolina Claims a Gain of 9,427 Since '70.

### The American Rifle Team Beat a Canadian Team at 800 Yards Range.

### An Excursion Train of Knights Templars, from California, Passes Omaha.

### Loss of Life and Property at Red Hill by an Explosion of Powder.

Chicago, Ill., August 14.—A Tribune Washington special respecting the Southern census frauds, says the editor of the Washington Republican who was banished from South Carolina on account of his republicanism, and who is familiar with every county in the State, in analyzing the returns from counties which shows increase, says: Take for instance the county of Kershaw. Its increase from 1870 to 1880, is 9,427 or 80 per cent. in ten years. Only one railroad touches this county, and that not until lately; it only runs one passenger coach and that every other day. There is no factory or mine in the county. It is purely agricultural in its industries, and its largest town, Camden, is a place of about 1,000 inhabitants, half of which are white; and perhaps the sleepiest place on the continent. The growth of the county in the last fifty years past has been backward instead of forward. In 1839 it contained 13,545 persons, and in 1870, fifty years later, it had but 11,754, a loss of 1,791; but from 1870 to 1880, it springs to 21,181. If these figures do not excite General Walker's suspicion, they will certainly excite those of the country. We would like to rest our case upon Kershaw county. If General Walker will furnish the men and means we will undertake to prove that the census in Kershaw is a bold fraud within ten days. If this was a Western State, this phenomenal increase could easily be explained by the influx of emigrants from the old states and from abroad; but in South Carolina no such explanations are applicable. There are not probably 1,000 more foreigners in the State than there was in 1860, and she has lost more than she has gained by movement of her native population.

Denver, August 14.—The Times this morning has the particulars of a terrible accident which occurred at Red Hill. About 12 o'clock fire broke out in the D. & S. P. depot, and exploded one thousand pounds of powder blowing every building in the place to atoms. Agent T. E. Collier was badly injured by burns and cuts, and his wife will probably die. His assistant Charley Hilton, was killed and two other men seriously injured.

Further particulars of the explosion at Red Hill, last night are to the effect that Frank Colyer, agent, T. J. Conway, assistant agent, and Charles Glenn, freighter, were setting in the depot, waiting for the train, when the explosion occurred. When the Fairplay coach reached the scene soon after, the passengers found Charles Hilton, an employee, fearfully mangled, not a stitch of clothing, save one sock, on him. Colyer was severely wounded about the head and it is feared his skull is broken. Conway was internally injured, but not fatally. Glenn was wounded about the body but not seriously, his coat was split from the neck down. The ground on which the depot, freight house, eating house and saloon stood is now bare, the buildings were blown into splinters from the size of a tooth-pick to fine kindling wood; not one stick or another remains of the five buildings. Its said that twelve cases of giant powder were in the freight house, but this is a mere rumor, and there is some mystery about the affair. Agent Colyer, who has recovered consciousness, says there was no powder about the place. The wounded were removed to Fairplay. It is said that

the stage driver caught a scoundrel breaking into the safe after the explosion.

Omaha, Neb., August 14.—It is reliably reported that the democrats and greenbackers of Nebraska are forming a fusion combination and will make a united effort to defeat the Republicans this fall. The agreement is that the electoral ticket shall consist of four democrats and three greenback candidates. The greenbackers are to name the candidates for governor and auditor, and the democrats are to name the remaining faction of the ticket; senatorial and representative candidates, for the legislature, are to come from both parties, and the places are to be distributed as equally as possible. The greenback State convention which was to meet at Washington the first Wednesday in September has been postponed to meet at the same time and place with the democratic State convention.

Omaha, August 14.—A California excursion train of ten pullman coaches having on board hundred and fifty Knights Templar, hundred ladies and the second California regimental band, twenty one pieces, arrived this afternoon. There were fifteen commanderies from California in five divisions, one commander from Oregon, Nevada, Montana and Utah. At Council Bluffs they were met by a delegation from St. Bernard commandery of Chicago. They went to Chicago over the C. B. & Q. R. R. in two special trains elaborately decorated with flowers, banners &c. Nebraska Knights leave by a special train over the Chicago and R. I. in the morning. The Wyoming delegation passed through this afternoon. The Colorado delegation will pass through to-morrow afternoon.

London, August 14.—The following is a verbatim copy of a dispatch received by the Daily News from its correspondent at St. Petersburg last night: I have grave reason to believe that Ayoub Khan has been acting in concert with and has been assisted by Abdurrahman Khan and that the worst suspicions are not without some foundation. I would assuredly not send such disconcerting intelligence except on most serious ground. The expression "worst suspicions" is interpreted to mean Russian intrigues or possibly to rumors of actual Russian co-operation with Ayoub Khan.

New York, August 14.—The Commercial Bulletin accepting the most liberal estimates advanced as to the import requirement of Europe and reducing Russia's probable export to an extreme minimum the quantity of wheat required of us will be under 100,000,000 bushels, yet we are likely to have some 235,000,000 bushels available for other purposes than our ordinary domestic consumption. Nothing but exceedingly low prices will enable the enormous surplus to be disposed of.

Saratoga, August 14.—In the heat race, of three-fourths of a mile, Oriole took first and third heats and race. Col. Sprague won the second heat, Chimney Sweep was third in the first and second heats, Ada Glenn second in the first heat, Oriole taking that place in the second heat, time 1:18 3-4, 1:18 3-4, 1:22. Col. Sprague was the favorite in the pools. The steeple chase over the usual course was won by Waller, Rose second and Derby third.

Denver, Colorado, August 14.—A young woman, known as Gypsy Deluke, an inmate of Madame Ullman's house of ill-fame, took morphine last night and died this morning. The desertion of a hack driver named Al Woolly was the cause of the act. Deceased's real name was Minnie Wilkenson, formerly of Montpelier, Texas where her relatives are now living.

A special train containing over a hundred Knight Templars left the depot at one o'clock this afternoon to attend the tri-annual convocation at Chicago.

Omaha, Nebraska, August 14.—The Republican congressional convention, for the eighth district of Iowa, after a two days session at Council Bluffs, and after casting 170 ballots without making a nomination, adjourned this afternoon until 2 o'clock next Tuesday.

Col. W. F. Sapp, of Council Bluffs, present incumbent, received 54 votes, requiring only three more to be nominated; Major Anderson received 36 1-2; W. P. Hepburn 13 1-2, and J. Y. Stone 9.

Baltimore, August 14.—Fifty-five young women took the black veil today in the convent of Notre Dame at German Stone near the city. Trains from here to German Stone were much crowded in the morning with relatives and friends of the postulants. A ceremony imposing and impressive was witnessed by the crowded congregation.

New York, August 14.—The long range riflematch between Candian and U. S. riflemen took place to-day at Credmoor. The weather and wind were favorable. Shooting began at 10:15. The firing was rapid and in about an hour each side had finished work at 800 yards range. The following is the score: Americans, 439; Canadians, 427.

Chicago, August 14.—Detroit was startled by an unexpected business failure to-day, that of Thos. McGraw, of the firm of Walker, McGraw & Co., who is president of the Michigan Savings Bank, and a prominent tobaccoist and wool buyer of that city. Liabilities heavy; assets \$260,000.

Silver Cliff, Colorado, August 14.—Frank Koppler, a German, aged 54 years, was burned to death to-night, in the city hospital, by falling out of bed and pulling a lamp over on himself. When found he was in flames and died before the fire could be extinguished. No damage was done to the building.

Denver, Col., August 14.—A north bound freight train on the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad, ran into a washout about ten miles south of Littleton this afternoon; the engine and three cars was ditched, and the engineer, named Nolan, was so badly injured that he died in a few hours; the fireman was only slightly injured.

Berlin, August 14.—A dead Afghan mentioned as having been found on the road from Samarcana to Russia is supposed to have been an emissary to Russia. He was an Afghan chief who was attached to Abdurrahman before the latter left Turkistan. He was a bearer of dispatches from Abdurrahman to Gen. Kaufman.

London, August 14.—According to reports from Bucharest, 45,000 Russian are concentrating near the border to be ready in event of an action with Bulgaria.

Transportation of horses, camping stores and troops is continually going on near Proalier. A steamer arrived at Golatz Saturday with Russian artillery and ambulances destined for Bulgaria. Its also stated that the Russians are concentrating at Radezcut, off on the Austrian frontier.

Bath, N. Y. August 14.—About 5 o'clock this evening J. E. Porthurst, a young lawyer of this village shot and killed Tamme Howell, a daughter of a merchant here and killed himself. They were married about four years ago but in January were divorced. They were in a hotel when the tragedy occurred.

Paris, August 14.—Experiments with submarine telephone from Brest to Punzance were made in the presence of the directors of the French cable and others. A new system invented by Dr. Herz was very successful. The Bell and Phillips system governed the experiments. Edison's system failed.

Onetta, August 14.—Fresh native reports state that Ayoub Khan still intends to attack Candahar. His hesitation to attack does not arise in disbelief of his capacity but because he is uncertain whether to attack by Escalade or Sajo and mine.

Bucharest, August 14.—The Bulgarians positively refuse to cede Arab Tobia to Roumania and there are large armed bands of Bulgarians in that vicinity. Roumania has taken measures to occupy Immy on the receipt of notification from the powers.

London, August 14.—There was a home rule demonstration at Glasgow to-day, which was attended by 30,000 Irishmen, from Scotland, and resolutions were adopted strongly denouncing the existing land laws and house lords.

Washington, D. C., August 14.—A mail contractor on the route between Ft. Davis and El Paso, N. M., asks for military protection against the Indians. The dispatch was referred to the war department.

Berlin, August 14.—Crop prospects in upper Silesia are very gloomy.

Little Rock, Arks., August 14.—The authorities at Washington have ordered the military in Arkansas to turn over Payne, the interloper in the Indian Territory, to the marshal of the western district of Arkansas for trial at Fort Smith.

Paris, August 14.—Dumont, manager of the newspaper, "Gilblas," has been sentenced to ten months imprisonment and to pay a fine of 500 francs for indecent publication.

New York, August 14.—Jacob L. Dodge deceased here Thursday was formerly a cattle dealer in California where he amassed a considerable fortune.

Ischel, August 14.—The Prince and Princess of Roumania arrived here to-day and were received by the Emperor.

Washington, D. C., August 14.—The Prince of Roumania will send a special envoy to the United States to announce the independence of Roumania.

Longbranch, August 14.—The mile and a half race was won by Onedian; Ferida, second; time, 2:40.

Mile race was won by Belle of West; Anna Augusta, was second; time, 1:43 1-2.

The three-fourths mile was won by Vigil; Topsey, second; time, 1:16 1-4.

Berlin, August 14.—Fresh floods in several districts in upper Silesia are causing enormous damage.

St. Petersburg, August 14.—There are grave reasons to believe Ayoub Khan is acting in concert with and has been assisted by the present Ameer.

Paris, August 14.—Delany, a Swiss citizen has been ordered to quit France, being regarded as a dangerous socialist.

London, August 14.—Vincity says the marriage of Lady Burdett Coats and Asmead Bartlett will take place Tuesday, at Chapel Royal.

London, August 14.—The House of Commons passed the Employers liability bill.

London, August 14.—Burglars stole £12,000 worth of jewelry and plate from the residence of Lord Eldon, near Waremham.

Buenos Ayres, August 14.—President Avaelando has resigned.
