School Exercises—A Case to be Fitted—The Man With a Gun—Card of Thanks—And other Local Notes and Notices.

A Case to be Fitted.

The case of W. E. Davis, who was arrested Thursday night on the charge of embezzlement, a notice of which appeared in yesterday's GAZETTE, is one provocative of sympathy. Davis claims that the \$500 for which he is short was lost from his pocket, and he so informed the company at the time. The shortage was no discovery of theirs, but was called to their attention by himself. What seems to confirm the young man's story is, that afterward some \$800 of the company's money came into his hands, and was placed by him in the bank to their credit. He still further shows his honesty, by offering to work out the amount for the company; and it was on the promise that he should be permitted to do so, that he was inveigled down here. They agreed to give him a good salary, keeping back \$40 each month until the deficit should be paid; but immediately on his getting out of the city, he was arrested and cast into jail. Yesterday the case came up before Judge Steele, and was continued till this morning. Bail for Davis was put at \$500, which he was unable to give, and so was remanded to jail. Breeden & Vincent appear for the prosecution, but Davis himself has this far, for lack of means, been unable to secure counsel. He is an orphan, and the only near relative, an uncle, was unwilling to assist him before his arrest, in making good the loss. What the uncle will now do, if anything, is unknown. Davis' good character while here in business should go a good way in his favor.

School Exhibitions.

The school taught by Prof. Jones in the public school building on Douglas avenue, closed yesterday for the summer vacation. When it opens in the fall it will again be a public school for some months. There were no closing exercises of any kind. It is true that much of the usual June exercises of schools, in the form of songs, declamations, essays, dialogues and the like, are anything but profitable to either pupils or patrons. A good deal of valuable time is consumed in preparation, and after it all is prepared and has been launched upon the suffering audience, the child is no wiser the better for it. Still, it is to be doubted if schools should close as unceremoniously as a candle is blown out. There should be something for the children to look forward to, something to keep up the esprit du corps, something to stimulate the teacher to unfeeling labor up to the last moment. Nothing will do this so well as final examinations. Let the friends and patrons be invited, select a competent committee, and have the children subjected to a real and thorough examination. When schools close in this way some good is done, and there is no danger of matters gradually dawdling out, as they are likely to do, if no closing exercises are had whatever.
