



Sidney M. Wharton of White Oaks, was nominated by the democrats for representative from Lincoln, Chaves and Eddy counties, last Thursday evening at Roswell. Wharton was superintendent of school of Lincoln county in 1896 and is a practicing lawyer in White Oaks.

The democracy of Eddy county met in primary convention last Saturday and selected its standard bearers for the coming November election. The fairest system known—the Australian ballot—which was carried out to the letter, was used. Each voter was compelled in order to vote to use a ballot given him by the judges of election and in Eddy precinct a rubber stamp seal was placed upon each ballot cast to distinguish it from sample ballots used to canvass with. That this plan of making nominations is the best is proven from the fact that the republicans object to democrats using it. "It would be so much better to turn all loose at the general election"—so as to give republicans an opportunity to get in office. This is the desire of our republican friends. But Eddy county democrats know if the primary system is given up that this county will soon become a mugwump republic. The primary system has its faults but they are not so many as the convention plan of making nominations. A convention may be manipulated but a primary election cannot be any more than a general election. Then, were we to hold a convention to make nominations, no doubt about the same ticket would be nominated.

The nomination of a democratic ticket was made in a very orderly and pleasant manner last Saturday, no disturbance of any manner occurring in Eddy precinct, where the large share of votes were cast. As might be expected where the contestants for the best office in the county run so close together as six votes a contest was inevitable, but the contest was settled in the party and all will no doubt stand shoulder to shoulder for the success of the whole ticket from delegate to surveyor.

Crozier Wants a Newspaper. The following circular was received by several business men in Eddy, Wednesday of this week: OFFICE OF THE TRENTON NEWS. By Ernest Loosdon. TRENTON, TEXAS, SEPT. 26, 1898. Eddy, New Mexico.

DEAR SIR:—I am contemplating the establishment, at once, of a first-class Democratic newspaper in your town. I have recently corresponded with Mr. J. B. Crozier, your Democratic chairman, in regard to the enterprise, and he thinks there is an excellent opening at Eddy for such a paper. Of course a newspaper, in order to exist, must have the support of its home people. That is my trouble at present—the people here—the merchants—do not appreciate a paper—hence I am forced to look elsewhere for a location. Mr. Crozier has kindly provided me with a list of some of the prominent men and merchants of Eddy, designating those who are democrats from the rest. This letter is

addressed only to those who are Democrats, as, this being my political belief, it is necessary that I should be assured of support in my labors by those of my own party. Should the successful in securing some-what encouragement to justify my entering upon this work, I shall issue an 8-page paper, such as the CURRENT of your town, except that I shall print at least four pages at home, and, if the patronage justifies it, will make it all home print. In any event I would print a paper of which my town might be proud. I have had more than ten years of practical experience in the newspaper business exclusively, and am capable of issuing an up-to-date paper in every respect.

Now, my object in thus addressing you is to ascertain what encouragement you would give toward such a paper as I have described above. It is my earnest request that you will give the matter careful consideration for a day or two, and then, using the stamped envelope enclosed herewith, write me whether or not you would extend encouragement to the paper, moral or financial, and, if you are running a business of any kind, give me some idea of the amount you would invest in advertising space each month for a period of two years. If I can get reasonable support for the first two years, I will then have the paper on a firm, self-sustaining basis, and I am satisfied the paper that I issued would of itself command support.

Please let me hear from you as soon as possible, and if I receive the necessary encouragement I will come to Eddy at once and complete arrangements for starting the paper immediately. Hoping to hear from you at once, I am Yours very truly, ERNEST LOOSDON.

It is kind of Mr. Crozier to seek to add new enterprises to the town, for there are not enough newspapers in Eddy to keep up the town at present. With a few more dispensing a couple of hundred dollars a month more among the people, than their total receipts will amount to, the town would be in a thrifty condition. Mr. Crozier must have a terrible spite against Texas democratic editors, for two he succeeded in locating here the fall of 1895 left the town in debt for board and two widow women each mourn their departure to the sum of twenty dollars apiece or about forty dollars in all. Then the poor fellows would have been compelled to walk were it not for the kindness of the railway company, for Mr. Crozier would not help them. If the Trenton man wants to learn a little about the situation here he should correspond with R. L. Barnett of the West Texas Stockman, Colorado City, Texas. The only reason that the democratic chairman has for using his official position to induce new enterprises of the above character to locate here is because the CURRENT refuses to be dictated to by him and generally does about what it believes right, which seldom harmonizes with Crozier's views, especially when it comes to stirring his personal enemies.

We have traveled over the southern states at different times and lately we visited the territory of New Mexico, visiting that territory with the express view of learning, if possible, of its value as a health resort for the consumptive. Our first stop was at Eddy, located in the Pecos Valley, at an elevation of something like 3,000 feet. Next was the beautiful town of Roswell at a much higher altitude. Here we found a clear sky and lovely climate and without the extreme changes or more northerly regions. We found here many persons that had come for relief in the various stages of consumption (so claimed) and were to all appearance enjoying fair health, at least so long as they remained. To sufferers from, or rather those fearing lung troubles, New Mexico offers conditions favorable to the non-development of pulmonary diseases; we mean that it is a favorable climate for those predisposed to lung disease. It is a climate suited to the case before the destructive stage has arrived. Here is found a dry aseptic air, a light atmospheric pressure, a large amount of sunshine, dry porous soil, and never too hot when one is shaded away from the sun. The air is fresh and stimulating, the prevailing winds traverse a wide expanse of arid regions, consequently are freed of dampness; hence one can be out of doors a large share of the time, an almost positive necessity for person of weak lungs. Our observations are such that we would recommend the Pecos Valley of New Mexico to those persons not having reached the stage of disintegration. Our advice is to go there and engage in farming or stock raising, either of which offers large returns to the industriously inclined. Land is cheap and can be had on easy terms. Farming in New Mexico, under irrigation, is a pleasure as well as being profitable. We think that no better climate need be looked for.—Dr. Watson in New England Medical Monthly.

Chas. H. Sparks. The sad, though not unexpected

News came by wire that Charles H. Sparks died in the hospital in St. Louis Tuesday morning of paralysis. He was stricken here some three months ago and was thought to be recovering. He was taken to St. Louis some three weeks ago in the hope of being permanently cured. Mr. Sparks came to the valley in 1874 as the agent of the P. J. Stanley Jail company and built the Chaves county court house. Liking the country and climate better than any section he ever visited, he decided to locate and built the first brick residence ever erected in the valley. Some four years ago he was married to Miss Byrd McCord, daughter of Col. J. E. McCord, of Coleman, Texas who with a little son two and a half years old, survive him. Chas. H. Sparks was one of our most aggressive, progressive and enterprising citizens. Practically an invalid since his early manhood, he fought the battle of life against great odds and succeeded better than most strong healthy men. His remains will be shipped here for interment and he will be laid to rest by his brothers of Roswell Lodge No. 15 A. F. & A. M. To his widow and son, his brother and sister, the sympathies of the whole community are extended. Funeral services will be held at the home Sunday morning at 9:30, and the interment will follow at the South Side cemetery.—Roswell Record.

Call for Democratic Council Convention.
