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BILLS INTRODUCED BY DELEGATE ANDREWS

Appropriating \$200,000 for Public Building at Albuquerque—Creates Seventh Judicial District

The following bills have been introduced by Delegate W. H. Andrews in the House of Representatives and are now pending in committees:

A bill to provide for the erection of a public building at Albuquerque, Territory of New Mexico.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled:

That the secretary of the treasury be, and he is hereby, authorized to contract for the erection and completion on the site already acquired by the government of the United States for the purpose of a suitable building, including fire-proof vaults, heating and ventilating apparatus, and approaches for the use and accommodation of the United States postoffice and other government offices in the city of Albuquerque, Territory of New Mexico, the cost of said building, including said vaults, heating apparatus, and approaches, complete, not to exceed the sum of two hundred thousand dollars. The building shall be unexposed to danger from fire by an open space of at least twenty feet on each side, including streets and alleys.

A bill to provide for an additional associate justice of the supreme court of the Territory of New Mexico.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled:

That hereafter the Supreme Court of the Territory of New Mexico shall consist of a chief justice and six associate justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum: Provided, That the judge who presided at the trial of a cause in the court below shall not sit at the hearing of the same case on appeal or writ of error in the Supreme Court of the Territory.

Sec. 2. That it shall be the duty of the President to appoint an additional associate justice of said supreme court in the manner now provided by law, who shall hold his office for the term of four years and until his successor is appointed and qualified.

Sec. 3. That the said Territory shall be divided into seven judicial districts, and a district court shall be held in each district by one of the judges of the supreme court at such time and place as is or may be prescribed by law. Each judge, after assignment, shall reside in the district to which he is assigned.

Sec. 4. That the present chief justice and his associates are hereby vested with power and authority, and they are hereby directed, to divide said territory into seven judicial districts and make such assignments of the judges provided for in the first section of this act as shall in their judgment be meet and proper; Provided, That one of said judges shall reside and hold a district court in the city of Socorro.

Sec. 5. That the said district court shall have jurisdiction, and the same is hereby vested to hear, try, and determine all matters and causes that the courts of the other districts of the territory now possess; and for such purposes two terms of said court shall be held annually at such places within the said district as may be designated by the chief justice and his associates or a majority of them, and grand and petit juries shall be summoned therein in the manner required by law.

Sec. 6. That all offenses committed before the passage of this act shall be prosecuted, tried and determined in the same manner and with the same effect (except as to the number of judges) as if this act had not passed.
