### Jenkins Flat Happenings

[CORRESPONDENCE.]

We will write you a message from this community. Everthing seems prosperous. Men are building houses, fencing, plowing, boring wells, setting posts, teaching school and preaching the Gospel or in other words doing all they can to build up the country. We have some drones certainly, but we have not been able to observe a working hive of bees in our lifetime that had no drones. Now I believe this to be as pretty a valley as one ever saw in any country. We are surrounded on all sides by beautiful mountains. We have plenty of good water and at very reasonable depths and occasionally a spring. This Valley lies southwest of Tucumcari some fifteen miles and between the Plaza Loop and Charcoal valleys. Most of the lands valuable for agriculture have been homesteaded, though there may be an occasional vacant 160 yet and a few claims subject to contest. It will only be a short time until all the lands that can be farmed will be fenced and our public roads put on section lines.

The valley her has one very serious drawback, the prairie dog if we can rid the valley of the dog the rabbit pest will also go with them, as they are fellow burrowers in the ground and inhabit the same villiges. What wheat there has been sown in the valley has been eaten off by the dog and their companions, the rabbits. We have some feed stuff left yet but it is going to be needed before it grows again. After this year if it continues to rain sufficiently for all sorts of crops, it may be come a question as to what our "money crop" will be. Some of our people are going to plant cotton. If the cotton plant will grow and mature in this climate we will be in the swim for we will be immune from bowl weevil and other pest that destroy the crop in the South with such frequency.

I believe that alfalfa will grow, and if it will, it surely must take the place as king of stock farm products of the Southwest. All kinds of stock thrive on it and all kinds of fowls. Once get a stand and you have an everlasting crop. Have seen it that the grower claimed to have been standing for several years. Another thing we must attend to is the orchard. We must put out fruit trees enough to raise our own supply and to spare. We are now raising on the farm our own corn and meat and so long as we have plenty of hog and hominy we will not starve.

Our people are anxious to see good schools and churches for the full and complete education of their children.
