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CURRY, GOV. OF SAMAR SUCCEEDS GOV. HAGERMAN

Yesterday's Dispatches Confirm Hagerman's Resignation and Curry's Appointment.

NEW MEXICO WILL WELCOME CURRY.

New Mexican Special from Washington says: Governor Hagerman has resigned and Captain George Curry, Governor of Samar, Philippine Islands, will be his successor. **NEW MEXICAN.**

While the selection of Governor George Curry of Samar, Phillipine Islands to succeed Governor Hagerman, resigned, comes as a surprise to the News, there is not a citizen of the United States if a still hunt of a year were made that would please us better. We were under the impression that he is too useful in the Philippines to be given up by the government at this time. His career in the Phillipine Islands has been a revelation to his friends and to his country. After establishing civil government in Mandanao, an admitted difficult task, he was sent to the Island of Samar where revolution was sizzling like a volcanic crater. Good report came immediately, and it is a matter of current event news today what he has accomplished there. It is more than anybody had a right to expect. New Mexico is proud of his record there, and here, before he went to the Philippines, and there will be greater rejoicing at his homecoming as Governor of this Territory, we believe, than any other New Mexican who ever lived. New Mexico is home to Curry, he has our welfare at heart, and he has done as much as any other living man for her civilization and advancement. He is New Mexico's Curry and we are glad he is coming home.

Southwestern Will Build Shops Here.

Southwestern specials Nacagara and Cloudercroft, bearing Vice-President Jones, his father and mother, General Manager Simmons; Hawkes, general superintendent; Paxton, superintendent of motive power; Morris, superintendent of transportation, and H. S. Brickley, general foreman of Dawson branch machinery department, spent a day

here last week. In an interview Mr. Paxton said: "We are going to put in a small shop at Tucumcari in order to take care of engines off the Dawson line. The Southwestern has ordered seven new engines for service on the Dawson line, in order to handle the 500 to 1,000 loads of coke and coal that is now consumed by the company's road and smelters in Arizona."

SHOPS AND ROUND HOUSE FOR TUCUMCARI

Information is Received and Considered reliable that the R. I. Ry. and Southwestern Have at Last Reached a Traffic Agreement.

TUCUMCARI A FREIGHT & PASSENGER DIVISION

The Rock Island and Southwestern have given it out flatly this week that a fifteen-stall round house and shops to accommodate both roads at this point will be erected here immediately. Some of the material for the shops is now on the ground and other preparations will be pushed as fast as possible and the whole thing is to be in operation in sixty days. The Southwestern will handle all freight from Tucumcari west and the Rock Island will double back east from this point. In connection with what we have this will give Tucumcari a pay roll of 400 to 500 men a month. Still we grow.

HERN AND WILSON STILL AT LARGE

Territorial Police and Posse Still in Pursuit. News Expected Every Hour.

THREE HUNDRED DOLLARS REWARD OFFERED ON EACH

There is little to report in this affair this week further than that Hern and Wilson are still at large and eluding the officers very successfully. There has been only one battle since our last week's issue and in fact that was fought last Friday, but the sad result of the killing of Wilson's boy was not reported here until after the paper was out Saturday morning. Nobody knows, it seems, whether the boy was killed by the posse or by his own folks. The fight took place near the residence and something like 200 shots were fired and afterwards it was discovered that the boy was dead in the house with a bullet hole in his head. Wilson has told several people that he is wounded in the side and arm, but the hurts can't be serious, as he is able to ride and fight. A regular arsenal of arms and ammunition was found in the Hern residence. Five shot guns and a rifle were captured in the house and a horse, two overcoats and a pistol were taken from the desperadoes in this last fight. Rangers W.E. Dudley,

Meyer and other officials are still in pursuit and were last heard of in Dog Canyon going towards the Sacramento mountains. They have given out threats strongly against Sheriff Street, County Commissioner R.J. Darnell and Bryant all of whom they say they are going to lay in wait for and kill, and then come out in the open and fight it out with any who care to come into battle. The community out there is in terror fearing the attack of the outlaws at any time.

Bud Lee returned Thursday from Raton, where he had been to attend the trial of Cabe Adams. He informs us that Adams plead guilty and was sentenced to ten years in the penitentiary.

J. M. Sconce was in from Grady Thursday after more freight for Grady merchants. He reports the town flourishing. These reports are coming from all the towns in Quay county. It sounds good to us to hear that our neighbors prosper.
