SEVEN TEXAS MINERS KILLED IN CAVE-IN

Rockdale, Tex., Oct. 16.—Seven miners perished when the Vogel & Lawrence coal mine, two miles east of this place, was flooded late today as the result of a cave in under a creek which runs above one of the mine galleries. This was caused by an eight inch rain which fell from 11:30 o'clock this morning until 7 o'clock tonight.

The mine has been in operation fifteen years and works about fifty men. These men are Mexicans and they live with their families near the pit head of the mine. They do not work in regular shifts, but are assigned a certain number of loads to fill. They fill the required number and leave the mine.

The cave occurred about 5 o'clock this afternoon and came without warning. Most of the men had left the mine and others narrowly escaped up a seventy-foot ladder from the bottom of the main shaft. The seven men who perished had not finished their work.

Tonight the entire mine is flooded and probably will be days before the bodies can be recovered. The miners worked under numbers and it was not possible to identify their names.

There were piteous scenes at the entrance to the shaft, but no hope was held out for those men who failed to reach the surface.

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
