AN IMPORTANT FOOD LAW.

Heavy Penalties for Selling Articles of Food Containing Unhealthy Ingredients.

The following law was passed at the last session of the Missouri legislature, taking effect Aug. 20, 1898:

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person or corporation doing business in this state to manufacture, sell or offer to sell any article, compound or preparation for the purpose of being used or which is intended to be used as a food, or as an ingredient in which article, compound or preparation there is any arsenic, calomel, bismuth, ammonia or alum.
